#### CERTIFICATE OF AGENT OR SUPERINTENDENT.

#### SPECIAL NOTE.

This form must be executed in duplicate when a child is transferred from a reservation to a non-reservation school. The Superintendent of the nonreservation school will retain the original for his files, and the duplicate shall be deposited in the Agency records. The agent will then send to the Commissioner of Indian Affairs his certificate as provided by law. All the blanks must be properly filled in every case.

NOTE.—Age limits, fourteen to twenty years. Preferably fourteen to eighteen. Students must be at least one-fourth Indian, preferably full Indian. Special cases beyond the age limit will be given consideration. An industrial course only can be taken and the term reduced to three years, in exceptional cases.

#### INDORSEMENTS.

The laws relating to the transfer of Indian children from reservations and schools are as follows:

That hereafter no Indian child shall be sent from any Indian reservation to a school beyond the State or Territory in which said reservation is situated without the voluntary consent of the father or mother of such child if either of them is living, and if neither of them is living without the voluntary consent of the next of kin of such child. Such consent shall be made before the agent of the reservation, and he shall send to the Commissioner of Indian Affairs his certificate that such consent has been voluntarily given before such child shall be removed from such reservation. And it shall be unlawful for any Indian agent or other employee of the Government to induce, or seek to induce, by withholding rations or by other improper means, the parents or next of kin of any Indian to consent to the removal of any Indian child beyond the limits of any reservation. (28 Stats., p. 906.)

Provided, that hereafter no Indian child shall be taken from any school in any State or Territory to a school in any other State against its will or without the written consent of its parents. (29 Stats., p. 348.)

The rules provide that—

A pupil who has been regularly enrolled in a nonreservation school must not be taken to any other nonreservation school without the consent of both Superintendents and the Commissioner of Indian Affairs, and Superintendents will be held to strict accountability for such pupils taken to their schools.

An Indian boy or girl 18 years old and over may, without the consent of parents or others, personally sign the application form on its being changed to suit the case.

This form is to be used only in transfers from reservations, or Indian schools, to nonreservation schools.

My dear Sir:

On Sunday evening Ellis Wright and two other boys from this school assaulted a young man from Carlisle on the public highway near the school and the three of them are now in the Cumberland County jail for safekeeping until they can be given a hearing on Thursday afternoon of this week. What is far more serious is that a butcher knife and several revolvers were taken away from them when they returned to school, and it was admitted by all of them this morning that they had one of the revolvers with them when the esseult was comitted.

The only action it is proposed to take is to see to it that the boys will have a fair chance to state their side of the case, but the charge is a most serious one and it may be expected that they will be dealt with as severely as they deserve.

My Dear Sir:

In reply to yours of the 26th, inst., relative to Ellis S. Wright, I am enclosing herewith K. C. draft number 23364, in the sum of 12.50, Twelve Dollars is to pay Ellis' fine, and fifty cents for stamps, which the boy has told his guardian he needs. I will ask you to please pay this fine for him and to state to him that we are sending this money, not because we approve his actions, but we hope that this will be a lesson to him, and he will not get into any trouble like this again.

As I advised you that the guardian only has \$3.30, belonging to his ward, he has therefore advanced out of his own pocket the sum of \$9.20, which the boy should earn and pay back to his guardian, Mr. J. M. Gamble. The guardian asked me to state that he hopes Ellis will try to be a good boy hereafter, and I want to say that Mr. Gamble is doing more than most any other guardian would do for his ward, that is to advance money out of his own pocket.

The Guardian of Ellis S. Wright, who is in your school, has received two letters from his ward recently stating that he has been arrested for hitting a boy in the head and that he wants Twelve Dollars to pay his fine; that if he cannot get this money to pay his fine, he will have to serve a jail sentence of nine months. This seems rather unreasonable to us that it would take nine months to serve out a twelve Dollarfine, and we suspect that the boy may not be telling us the truth about it, and that he wants money for other purposes, perhaps to get away from school on. The guardian has but Three Dollars and Thirty cents (\$3.30), belonging to this ward. He says however that if Twelve Dollars will keep him out of jail for nine months, he is willing to let him have the money.

Will you please investigate this matter and let me hear from you at your earliest convenience?
