SPECIAL NOTE.

This form must be executed in duplicate when a child is transferred from a reservation to a non-reservation school. The Superintendent of the nonreservation school will retain the original for his files, and the duplicate shall be deposited in the Agency records. The agent will then send to the Commissioner of Indian Affairs his certificate as provided by law. All the blanks must be properly filled in every case.

NOTE.—Age limits, fourteen to twenty years. Preferably fourteen to eighteen. Students must be at least one-fourth Indian, preferably full Indian. Special cases beyond the age limit will be given consideration. An industrial course only can be taken and the term reduced to three years, in exceptional cases.

INDORSEMENTS.

The laws relating to the transfer of Indian children from reservations and schools are as follows:

That hereafter no Indian child shall be sent from any Indian reservation to a school beyond the State or Territory in which said reservation is situated without the voluntary consent of the father or mother of such child if either of them is living, and if neither of them is living without the voluntary consent of the next of kin of such child. Such consent shall be made before the agent of the reservation, and he shall send to the Commissioner of Indian Affairs his certificate that such consent has been voluntarily given before such child shall be removed from such reservation. And it shall be unlawful for any Indian agent or other employee of the Government to induce, or seek to induce, by withholding rations or by other improper means, the parents or next of kin of any Indian to consent to the removal of any Indian child beyond the limits of any reservation. (28 Stats., p. 906.)

Provided, that hereafter no Indian child shall be taken from any school in any State or Territory to a school in any other State against its will or without the written consent of its parents. (29 Stats., p. 348.)

The rules provide that—

A pupil who has been regularly enrolled in a nonreservation school must not be taken to any other nonreservation school without the consent of both Superintendents and the Commissioner of Indian Affairs, and Superintendents will be held to strict accountability for such pupils taken to their schools.

An Indian boy or girl 18 years old and over may, without the consent of parents or others, personally sign the application form on its being changed to suit the case.

This form is to be used only in transfers from reservations, or Indian schools, to nonreservation schools.

Mrs. Cyle of Kennett Sq. may return June Evans ^{at} any time. June is now too disabled for any country home because of her eyes and seems rather slow in her work. Possibly, the girl is not well. I will see her again near the end of the month but I have told Mrs. Cyle that since we cannot supply her with help for the month and if she can better herself at any time to return June to the school.

The enclosed is a letter written by Gladys Morris brother. Gladys says they never write only in connection with money affairs. She wants to know if she is entitled to any money now that she is twenty-one. Will you look into this for her.



under existing circumstances,
as stated.

Last year, when I was so
very ill and at the hospital
Gladys was such a faith-
ful child that I promised
her a permanent home with
us when her time expired at
Carlisle. Her time expired

her return to Barile is probably a very necessary step, and that I will end well, that she might be allowed to return ere long if you thought it was for her benefit.

No matter what arrangements are made for her, allow me to make a plea for extreme gentleness in handling her case. She can explain her affairs better than I can write them, and you will understand why we have taken such an unusual interest in her welfare.

I sincerely regret having made this mistake, and ask you to pardon me for any

next month, and naturally, when given permission to remain here, attending our schools, she registered, thinking all was well, when we hadn't heard from you up until Monday night.

Her case is unusual and most pathetic. Although she will be twenty two years of age next week, she just was entering the sixth grade. We worked with her, with her studies all of last year to keep her exempt in her studies and succeeded in all but arithmetic - her weak branch.

She has cried herself almost ill, but I have tried to explain to her that
