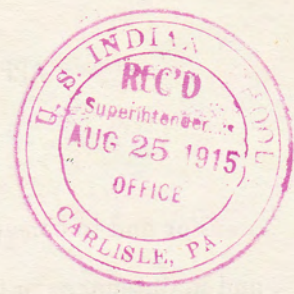

SPECIAL NOTE.

This form must be executed in duplicate when a child is transferred from a reservation to a nonreservation school. The Superintendent of the nonreservation school will retain the original for his files, and the duplicate shall be deposited in the reservation school records. The reservation superintendent should send to the Commissioner of Indian Affairs his certificate as provided by law. All the blanks must be properly filled in every case.

If the information called for on any part of the blank is not known, that fact should be stated. No space should be left unfilled. Whether the parents are living or dead, their names must be given.

The person who signs the blank as consenting to the transfer should indicate his relation to the applicant by marking out the word "parent," "guardian," or "next of kin," leaving unmarked only the title appropriate to the signer.

The enrollment of Indian pupils in nonreservation schools is governed by the "Rules for the Indian Service, 1913," sections 12, 13, 14, 15, 18, 19, 36, 112, 113, 114, 117, 118, 124 (b).

The Rules should be consulted before filling out the application blanks.

My dear Mr. Lipps:

Replying to your letter of the 23rd, concerning Mary Hill, I am sending you her check for \$10.00, which I think will be sufficient to pay her incidental expenses, including a sleeper ticket from Harrisburg if you think it advisable, as the trip will be a tiresome one at best. I think there is a train from Harrisburg about noon that will bring her to Chicago at 7-30 a.m. in time to take the 9 a.m. train to Green Bay, which she will reach at 3-15, in time to come out home the same night. Her ticket should be bought either to Oneida or to Green Bay Junction (not Green Bay) and her baggage checked to the Junction, unless you can buy and check to Oneida.

Mary was always a very strong and healthy girl here, and as she has lived at the school since she was six years old, the family influence has been practically nothing. One sister had measles here, and was taken to the home of her relatives against my advice, and there she contracted pneumonia, and finally tuberculosis. The brother was killed by the cars, and her mother died from accident also.

However, if she has tuberculosis, from whatever source, it is desirable that she be sent to home surroundings, not home as she has none, where we will see that she has every advantage that we can secure for her.

She was so well and strong here that I am hopeful that she may still be able to continue her work at the school, but if she can not, as her next of heart kin, if not blood relative, we would like to do what we can for her near home. The Hill girl has no parents, and her sisters are not able to do anything for her and if admission to Toledo can be secured it would be better for her to go there. I think I sent Alice a little money for Christmas, through your office, and hope it will be sufficient for her needs. She has not much money with me, but as long as it lasts, and as long as she does well, I would like to have her contented and happy. She will never be a very brilliant scholar, perhaps, but she is a capable worker, and I want her to take pride in herself.

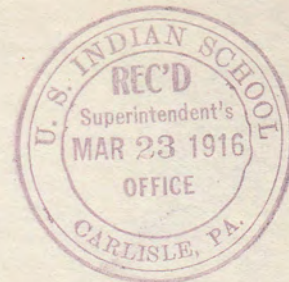

B., but of course it is possible, as the family history on the mother's side is not too good as to health.

She has no other home than the school, and has been with us since she was a tiny child, and we feel an especial interest in and responsibility for her, and naturally she looks to us for guidance in most things. She was always a good student, not particularly brilliant, but dependable, and the prospect of being demoted worries her. Will you kindly have a careful medical examination made and advise me.
