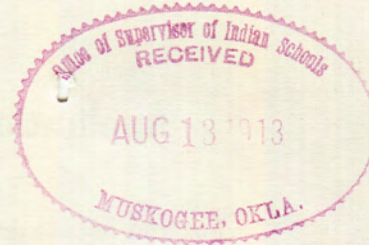

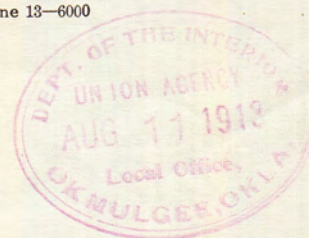

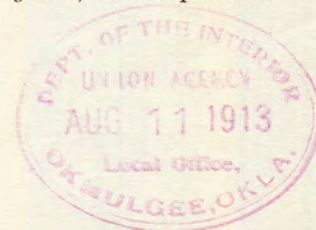

SPECIAL NOTE.

This form must be executed in duplicate when a child is transferred from a reservation to a non-reservation school. The Superintendent of the nonreservation school will retain the original for his files, and the duplicate shall be deposited in the Agency records. The agent will then send to the Commissioner of Indian Affairs his certificate as provided by law. All the blanks must be properly filled in every case.

NOTE.—Age limits, fourteen to twenty years. Preferably fourteen to eighteen. Students must be at least one-fourth Indian, preferably full Indian. Special cases beyond the age limit will be given consideration. An industrial course only can be taken and the term reduced to three years, in exceptional cases.



INDORSEMENTS.

The laws relating to the transfer of Indian children from reservations and schools are as follows:

That hereafter no Indian child shall be sent from any Indian reservation to a school beyond the State or Territory in which said reservation is situated without the voluntary consent of the father or mother of such child if either of them is living, and if neither of them is living without the voluntary consent of the next of kin of such child. Such consent shall be made before the agent of the reservation, and he shall send to the Commissioner of Indian Affairs his certificate that such consent has been voluntarily given before such child shall be removed from such reservation. And it shall be unlawful for any Indian agent or other employee of the Government to induce, or seek to induce, by withholding rations or by other improper means, the parents or next of kin of any Indian to consent to the removal of any Indian child beyond the limits of any reservation. (28 Stats., p. 906.)

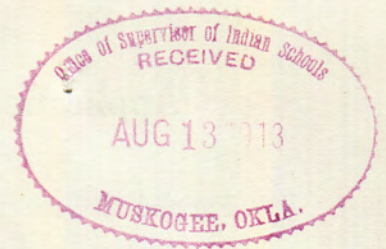
Provided, that hereafter no Indian child shall be taken from any school in any State or Territory to a school in any other State against its will or without the written consent of its parents. (29 Stats., p. 348.)

The rules provide that—

A pupil who has been regularly enrolled in a nonreservation school must not be taken to any other nonreservation school without the consent of both Superintendents and the Commissioner of Indian Affairs, and Superintendents will be held to strict accountability for such pupils taken to their schools.

An Indian boy or girl 18 years old and over may, without the consent of parents or others, personally sign the application form on its being changed to suit the case.

This form is to be used only in transfers from reservations, or Indian schools, to nonreservation schools.

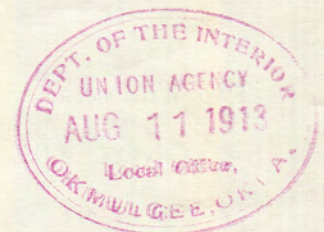

My dear Mr. Wyly:

Since the date your letter of November 15th relative to Katie Johnson's return home was received here further inquiry has been made in regard to the progress the girl is making and the need for having her continue longer with her work at this school. It has been learned that when Katie went to the Outing home where she is now staying and attending the public schools she absolutely could not be persuaded to answer questions except in monosyllables. For three weeks after she arrived at her Outing home she could not be persuaded to talk. However, the patron into whose care the girl was given worked patiently with her to gain her confidence and when our Girls' Outing Agent visited at Katie's Outing home this fall Katie recited very creditably "THE VILLAGE BLACKSMITH". In view of the fact that such progress has been made and Katie was enrolled in 1913 for a five year period of enrolment it is believed that she

should not be taken out of school at this time. If, at the close of this school year, her return home is yet advisable your further recommendations will then be considered.

I have your letter of October 8, in regard to Katie Johnson, I beg to herewith return the enclosures and make the following statement. I have met Mr. Bargo, the guardian, in Okemah on various occasions and has also talked to various parties who know Mr. Bargo, and from the information I gather is that he is very good citizen and a good farmer. He has been in the Creek Nation a number of years and this is his second Indian wife. He is using his very best effort in conserving the property belonging to his wife and her children, and also certain inherited interest they have.

I was in conference yesterday with an attorney in regard to certain interest they might have in some land and I believe that Katie would receive good schooling advantages here and that Mr. Bargo would see that she attended school. However, if she is enrolled in Carlisle for specified time, I don't think she should be permitted to leave until closing of this school term at least.

TEACHER.

TO PARENTS.

In all cases when the pupil is absent with your consent please give a written excuse.

The Board of Education requests that all Parents and Guardians assist in the enforcement of the following Compulsory School Law as your co-operation is absolutely necessary to realize the best results in the education of your child :

New Jersey Compulsory School Law.

ARTICLE XV.

1. Every parent, guardian or other person having charge and control of a child between the ages of seven and sixteen years shall cause such child regularly to attend a day school in which at least reading, writing, spelling, English grammar, arithmetic and geography are taught in the English language by a competent teacher, or to receive equivalent instruction elsewhere than at school, unless such child is above the age of fourteen years, has been granted an "age and schooling certificate" and is regularly and lawfully employed in some useful occupation or service. Such regular attendance shall be during all the days and hours that the public schools are in session in said school district, unless it shall be shown to the satisfaction of the board of education of said school district that the mental or bodily condition of the child is such as to prevent his or her attendance at school. * * Every child under the age of sixteen years who shall have completed the grammar school course prescribed for the district in which such child resides, who is not regularly and lawfully employed in any useful occupation or service, shall attend the high school designated by the board of education of said district.

4. Any parent, guardian or other person having charge and control of any child between the ages of seven and sixteen years, who shall fail to comply with any of the provisions of this article relating to his or her duties, shall be deemed to be a disorderly person. Upon the filing of a sworn complaint with the Court of Common Pleas of the county, or with a police justice or city, town or borough recorder of the municipality in which such school district shall be situate, a rule shall be issued by said court, police justice or recorder and served by the sheriff or any constable, requiring said disorderly person to appear before the court, police justice or recorder issuing said order, together with any child or children under the charge and control of the person upon whom said order is served, who have not been in regular attendance at school as required by this article, at the place and time and on the date specified in said rule, to show cause why said disorderly person should not be punished by a fine not exceeding five dollars for the first offense and not exceeding twenty-five dollars for each subsequent offense, in the discretion of the court, police justice or recorder. Upon the return of said rule and the appearance of said disorderly person, together with said child, said court, police justice or recorder shall inquire into the facts and make such disposition of the case as the law requires.

Should this card be lost finder will confer a favor by returning same to the teacher.

Referring to Office letter of July 11, and Office letter of August 22 to Mr. A.V. Skelton, of Okemah, Oklahoma, "Education-Schools; 98627-13; RHH; Enrollment", Mr. Skelton now prefers to send his ward, Katie Johnson, to the Carlisle School, Pennsylvania, as a pay pupil. The girl is but 12 years of age. The blot on her record at Nuyaka was due to the influence of her full-blood mother, from which Mr. Skelton desires to remove her.

Should the Office approve, therefore, and the Carlisle superintendent desire to receive this pupil, I will offer no protest. Non-Indian pupils or Indians who pay tuition there do not require my approval for transfer, according to Office letter of August 8, 1913.

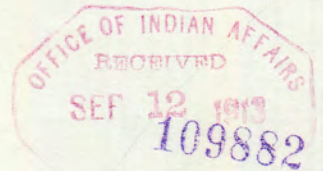

Replying to your favor of 28th ult, relative to the minor, Katie Johnson, I note that you indicate that a payment of \$167.00 tuition is required. In this connection, it ~~ix~~ has been suggested to me that full blood, restricted Indians are accorded the privileges of these Government free of this charge, and I have thought that possibly you was under the impression that this child is less than full blood. Kindly advise me if this charge always appies to full blood, restricted Indians. Anticipating that it will possibly take the better part of the time between now and opening day to get the proper permission, may I ask that this have your very early attention. If the Full bloods are accorded this right free, kindly enclose to me two other sets of application blanks, as we desire to send about two or three children from here together that they may not be so far away from home, and among entire strangers, with none of their own people there. 
My dear Sir:

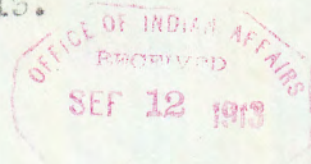

Sir:---

I have a ward, a full blood Indian girl, named Katie Johnson, Creek Indian. She is 12 years old this past May. We have asked to have her admitted at Chilocco Indian School, but they seem to have an age limit there of 14 years, but Hon. D. H. Bynum of the Creek Attorney's office at Muskogee as well as Mr. Brown's office at Muskogee has suggested to me that we place her in your school. I will say, however that our application for admission at Chilocco has not been wathdrawn, but there does not seem to be any prospect of its being granted. Her mother said to me this morning that if we are unable to get her in at Chilocco that she will be willing that she attend your school, even though the distance is far. We have ample funds to pay all your requirements, and it is my desire to give her the best education we can. She is a very bright child. I shall be glad to have you advise me of the terms of admission to your school, whether we may be admitted there, etc., and I will undertake to tell you in a couple of weeks whether we desire to avail ourselves of your place. 




