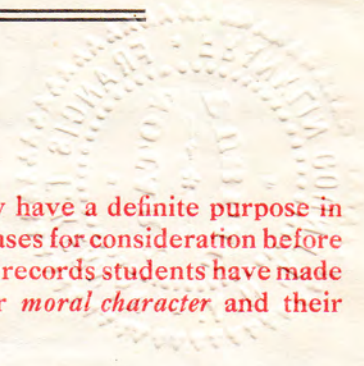

Application for Enrollment in a Nonreservation School.

(For a child not enrolled at an Agency.)

For and in consideration of the United States assuming the care, education, and maintenance in the United States Indian School at Carlisle, Penna., of Christie Loraine, female, I, John Loraine X of Hogansburg P. O., State of N. Y., do hereby voluntarily consent and agree to her enrollment in said school for a period of 3 years, and also obligate and bind myself to abide by all the rules and regulations for Indian schools.

I further say that the said child was born at St Regis Reservation on April 4 1902 that the father, John Loraine, is a Indian of the Mohawk Tribe located at St Regis Res. Agency; that he left the tribe about _____; that the mother, Christie Loraine, is a 1/2 Indian of the Mohawk Tribe located at St Regis Res. Agency, and left the tribe about _____; that the said child was born and reared in the United States, and now actually resides therein; and that he has attended the following schools:

INDORSEMENT.

A child showing one-sixteenth or less Indian blood, whose parents live on an Indian reservation, Indian fashion, who, if debarred from the Government schools, could not obtain an education, may be permitted in the reservation day and boarding schools, but it is preferable that it be not transferred to a nonreservation school, without permission from the Office. Children showing one-eighth or less Indian blood, whose parents do not live on an Indian reservation, whose home is among white people where there are churches and schools, who are presumed to have adopted the white man's manners and customs, and are to all intents and purposes white people, are debarred from enrollment in the Government nonreservation and reservation schools. Superintendents, in all cases where doubt exists as to the degree of Indian blood of a child proposed for transfer, should fully satisfy themselves of the facts by affidavits from reliable persons, which affidavits must be kept on file at the school.

A pupil who has been regularly enrolled in a nonreservation school must not be taken to any other non-reservation school without the consent of both Superintendents and the Commissioner of Indian Affairs, and Superintendents will be held to strict accountability for such pupils taken to their schools.

A pupil dismissed from school for cause must not be enrolled in any other school without the permission of the Commissioner of Indian Affairs. Full facts must be submitted with each request.

Miss Johnston who visits the girls while they are in the country and knows all the homes, tells me that this is the home where your other daughter Minnie, spent two seasons. Minnie liked it there after she got over her first spell of homesickness. Miss Johnston says the home is a good one and the people are kind to their girls. It is true, she says, that there is an old aunt in the home but she has nothing to do with the management of the home.

Mrs. Smith has had our Indian girls for many years and gives our girls the best of home influence. It is possible that Christie is only homesick just now, as the home is on a farm and just now there are no other Indian girls in the vicinity. Later on, there will be another girl near, and I think Christie will then be all right.
