- (1) An attendance of at least 90 per cent.
- (2) A recitation average for the term covered by the examination of at least 85.
- (3) No monthly average below 75 and not more than one monthly average below 85.
- (4) No monthly mark for conduct below "B" or "Good."

PROMOTION

Pupils are promoted by subjects rather than by classes. For promotion without condition a Final Average of 70 or above in each subject is required. The Final Average is found by adding twice the recitation average to the examination average and dividing this sum by three.

Full class standing and graduation require the satisfactory completion of all required work and of elective studies as specified in the Course of Study for the High School.

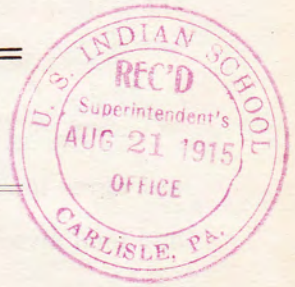

INDORSEMENT.

A child showing one-sixteenth or less Indian blood, whose parents live on an Indian reservation, Indian fashion, who, if debarred from the Government schools, could not obtain an education, may be permitted in the reservation day and boarding schools, but it is preferable that it be not transferred to a nonreservation school, without permission from the Office. Children showing one-eighth or less Indian blood, whose parents do not live on an Indian reservation, whose home is among white people where there are churches and schools, who are presumed to have adopted the white man's manners and customs, and are to all intents and purposes white people, are debarred from enrollment in the Government nonreservation and reservation schools. Superintendents, in all cases where doubt exists as to the degree of Indian blood of a child proposed for transfer, should fully satisfy themselves of the facts by affidavits from reliable persons, which affidavits must be kept on file at the school.

A pupil who has been regularly enrolled in a nonreservation school must not be taken to any other non-reservation school without the consent of both Superintendents and the Commissioner of Indian Affairs, and Superintendents will be held to strict accountability for such pupils taken to their schools.

A pupil dismissed from school for cause must not be enrolled in any other school without the permission of the Commissioner of Indian Affairs. Full facts must be submitted with each request.

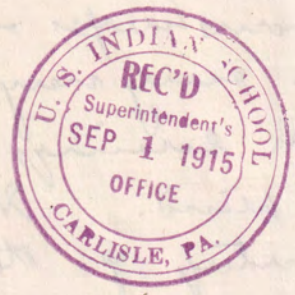

I am of the 4th received.

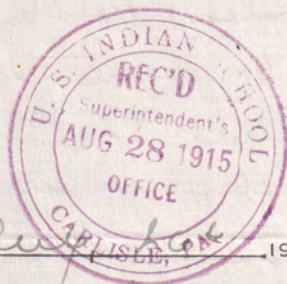
I am just about to leave for the first

Your daughter Josephine, as you know, is living this winter with Miss Comly, Greenside, Pennsylvania, ⁱⁿ one of our outing homes. She was getting along very well until soon after Christmas when she developed throat trouble. Her employer, acting upon the advice of Miss Johnston, our girls' field agent, took her to the Medico Chi Hospital for treatment. On March 5th, I had the following report from Miss Johnston,

"Today I visited Josephine Printup in the Medico Chi Hospital. Josephine had both adenoids and tonsils removed and her throat was in very bad condition. I judge she has been a very sick girl. Today she was feeling much better. Her eyes and ears will be attended to as soon as she is strong enough."

Yesterday I wrote to the physician who performed the operation upon Josephine for a full report regarding her condition. I will send you a copy of this when I get it.

Josephine's physical condition was not very good when she came to Carlisle. Last year we had her teeth fixed. When her eyes and ears have been attended to and she fully recovers from the operation upon her tonsils and adenoids, I think she will be able to do better school work.
