O., State of New York, do hereby voluntarily consent and agree to her enrollment in said school for a period of 3 years, and also obligate and bind myself to abide by all the rules and regulations for Indian schools.

I further say that the said child was born at Catt Res on Dec 10, 1903 (Date.) that the father, Frank Logan (Name of father.), a full Indian of the Seneca Tribe located at Catt Res Agency; that he left the tribe about _____; (Approximate date.) that the mother, Fidelia Logan (Name.) a full Indian of the Cayuga Tribe located at Catt Res Agency, and left the tribe about _____; (Approximate date.) that the said child was born and reared in the United States, and now actually resides therein; and that he has attended the following schools:

INDORSEMENT.

A child showing one-sixteenth or less Indian blood, whose parents live on an Indian reservation, Indian fashion, who, if debarred from the Government schools, could not obtain an education, may be permitted in the reservation day and boarding schools, but it is preferable that it be not transferred to a nonreservation school, without permission from the Office. Children showing one-eighth or less Indian blood, whose parents do not live on an Indian reservation, whose home is among white people where there are churches and schools, who are presumed to have adopted the white man's manners and customs, and are to all intents and purposes white people, are debarred from enrollment in the Government nonreservation and reservation schools. Superintendents, in all cases where doubt exists as to the degree of Indian blood of a child proposed for transfer, should fully satisfy themselves of the facts by affidavits from reliable persons, which affidavits must be kept on file at the school.

A pupil who has been regularly enrolled in a nonreservation school must not be taken to any other non-reservation school without the consent of both Superintendents and the Commissioner of Indian Affairs, and Superintendents will be held to strict accountability for such pupils taken to their schools.

A pupil dismissed from school for cause must not be enrolled in any other school without the permission of the Commissioner of Indian Affairs. Full facts must be submitted with each request.



Dear Sir:-

Rec'd your letter
and enclosed one to-day.
In regard to letter to Mrs.
Logan would state she -
that I had to write to
her in regard to some
personal matter relating to
Addie, and so thought she
would be pleased to hear
how her daughter was. I
told her just what I had
put in the reports to the
school that Addie was
now in excellent health
as far as I could see; that

she weighed 136 lbs., but - I
also said, for I thought
she ought to know, that
I did not think Carlisle
agreed with her for when
she came to me she was
constantly coughing and
spitting and had weak
spells. She (Mrs. Logan)
must have been somewhat
hysterical over her other
daughter for she did not
read my letter aright. After
about five weeks of country
air and diet, Addie be-
gan to improve, and has
been growing and develop-
ing ever since. I never
notice her coughing or
spitting any more, and she

himself says

There is no reason why
she should not find out
the contract, and about
the last week of August. It
will greatly inconvenience
me to have her go now,
and I really think I de-
serve some consideration
after having brought her
back to health and strength.
Her mother did not even
so much as thank me
for my trouble for I have
taken care of her as
one of my own.

I trust this letter will
end the matter, and I
shall be ready to send the
girl back by 26th of
August which Mr. Mc
Clelland says is the time.
