SPECIAL NOTE.

This form must be executed in duplicate when a child is transferred from a reservation to a nonreservation school. The Superintendent of the nonreservation school will retain the original for his files, and the duplicate shall be deposited in the reservation school records. The reservation superintendent should send to the Commissioner of Indian Affairs his certificate as provided by law. All the blanks must be properly filled in every case.

If the information called for on any part of the blank is not known, that fact should be stated. No space should be left unfilled. Whether the parents are living or dead, their names must be given.

The person who signs the blank as consenting to the transfer should indicate his relation to the applicant by marking out the word "parent," "guardian," or "next of kin," leaving unmarked only the title appropriate to the signer.

The enrollment of Indian pupils in nonreservation schools is governed by the "Rules for the Indian Service, 1913," sections 12, 13, 14, 15, 18, 19, 36, 112, 113, 114, 117, 118, 124 (b).

The Rules should be consulted before filling out the application blanks.

Dear Mr. Lipps:

I am enclosing herewith application papers for Alex Wakeman and Amos Jones, who are leaving this morning for Carlisle. The boys have been at work and did not like to start immediately upon receipt of transportation, as the employer of one boy objected to paying him his wages when he wanted to quit on such short notice.

Both boys come from good families and I trust will make good. Wakeman has a brother who is a Presbyterian missionary on the Pine Ridge reservation. Jones' father was a lay reader in the Episcopal church at this place for a good many years. The boys attended school here for some time but dropped out during Dr. Michael's regime and have not been in school since that time. It is probable that they cannot do fifth grade work at first, but will have to review for a while.

Alex Wakeman, who enrolled from here for five years three years ago, has been drafted and will probably go to one of the camps soon. He has written his people here asking them to send him \$40.00 to pay for his transportation. I do not understand just where he is to entrain, whether at Carlisle or at his home here at Flandreau. However, his grandmother is very old now and one of his brothers is in very poor health and is very doubtful whether he will ever see them again should he go into the army and if it is possible for you to pay his transportation here in order that he might come home for a short time I would recommend that such action be taken.

Your letter of the 23rd inst., making inquiry for yellow leather dress suit case reported left in Waiting Room, this station, April 22nd, by one of the Carlisle Indian Boys, has been received.

We have interviewed all porters and attendants employed at this station, and I have been unable to learn any information whatever regarding the missing dress suit case. I, however, learn that the dress suit case was left in our waiting room unguarded while the Indian boy went out into the street, and when he returned his dress suit case had disappeared, and the matter was at once reported to our special officer.

It was evidently picked up and taken away by some outside party.
