SPECIAL NOTE.

This form must be executed in duplicate when a child is transferred from a reservation to a nonreservation school. The Superintendent of the nonreservation school will retain the original for his files, and the duplicate shall be deposited in the reservation school records. The reservation superintendent should send to the Commissioner of Indian Affairs his certificate as provided by law. All the blanks must be properly filled in every case.

If the information called for on any part of the blank is not known, that fact should be stated. No space should be left unfilled. Whether the parents are living or dead, their names must be given.

The person who signs the blank as consenting to the transfer should indicate his relation to the applicant by marking out the word "parent," "guardian," or "next of kin," leaving unmarked only the title appropriate to the signer.

INDORSEMENTS.

The laws relating to the transfer of Indian children from reservations and schools are as follows:

That hereafter no Indian child shall be sent from any Indian reservation to a school beyond the State or Territory in which said reservation is situated without the voluntary consent of the father or mother of such child if either of them are living, and if neither of them are living without the voluntary consent of the next of kin of such child. Such consent shall be made before the agent of the reservation, and he shall send to the Commissioner of Indian Affairs his certificate that such consent has been voluntarily given before such child shall be removed from such reservation. And it shall be unlawful for any Indian agent or other employee of the Government to induce, or seek to induce, by withholding rations or by other improper means, the parents or next of kin of any Indian to consent to the removal of any Indian child beyond the limits of any reservation. (28 Stats., p. 906.)

Provided, That hereafter no Indian child shall be taken from any school in any State or Territory to a school in any other State against its will or without the written consent of its parents. (29 Stats., p. 348.)

That no Indian pupil under the age of fourteen years shall be transported at Government expense to any Indian school beyond the limits of the State or Territory in which the parents of such child reside or of the adjoining State or Territory. (35 Stat. L., 781.)

The rules provide that—

A pupil who has been regularly enrolled in a nonreservation school must not be taken to any other nonreservation school without the consent of both Superintendents and the Commissioner of Indian Affairs, and superintendents will be held to strict accountability for such pupils taken to their schools.

An Indian boy or girl 18 years old and over may, without the consent of parents or others, personally sign the application form on its being changed to suit the case; but in all cases where the parents are living they should first be consulted.

This form is to be used only in transfers from reservations or Indian schools to nonreservation schools.

Minda began school in September but missed two or three weeks because of cold.

My dear Miss Johnson:-

I know you have troubles enough of your own, with the girls, and I do hate awfully to add to them - yet I know it is, only right that I should tell you of some small dishonesties which I have found Minda connected with. It may be that you can help her to see the evil of wrong doing - I have tried very hard to, but it seems I have failed.

After she came shortly, she took a penknife from my room, and some pencils from

down slave, altho I had given her a nice new pencil - I took the things and excused her.

Before Christmas .25 (a quarter) and perhaps some small pieces disappeared from Calys bank - I let it pass, hoping by talking to her about honesty and dishonesty - she would realize the evil of it.

A short time ago I got a lot of samples, which I gave Minda to look over, as I like my Indian girls to enter as much as possible into the family life. She liked one of them & wanted a dress from it. I sent for it with my things, and this week she has been

said
making it on the sewing machine yesterday afternoon, I saw it was all finished, and was surprised to see the waist trimmed with lace which I was sure was mine. I said nothing then, but went up stairs and found instead of several yards of lace, there was a very small piece. I went directly to Minnda's room, asked to see her dress, and where she got the lace, she said she had it, brought it from Carlisle, I said "you got it from middle drawer of my spare room, and matched it with the small piece, she looked at me and denied time after time that it was mine, then I glanced in her trunk tray and saw a small Testament of mine which she had stolen & written her name in, also another book - (she always has had a Bible in her room) well you know she just simply lied time after time about the books, I turned about and said "Is that my lace", she said "Yes", well I gave her a pretty straight talk about the sin of stealing and lying - told her to ask God to forgive her, that she might die to night with that sin on her conscience, and she laughed in my face. I told her to take the

lace off, and I would report the whole matter to you, really, I do not believe she cared a rap, except that I had found it out.

Of course I do not care one bit for the things she took, it is the disappointment that she would do such a thing -

After the privilege she had had here, the auto rides, and pleasure trips, the cake, candy, ice cream & fruit -

you know girls do like such things - just the same - as the rest of the family, I really cannot get her point of view, and understand why she wanted to steal, I said 'llinda how can I believe

you again?', and she said very pertly "You don't have to believe me unless you want to."

You know she is to be with me until June, - and I that if you were not coming around before that, perhaps you would take time to write her, possibly you could make her see the sin of stealing and lying better than I. It is her good I desire.

So often I think about you, - and the discouragements and disappointments you have with the girls - and I always wind up, wondering if the Lord has as many disappointments with me,

as we do with the poor Indians
I wish you would come out and
spend the day with us these
spring days - I think it would do you
good.

I have written Mrs. Fassitt that the matter has been
reported to you.

April 9, 1915.

Minda Hill:-

I am indeed sorry to get a report from Miss Johnston this morning regarding your conduct. I am informed that you have been STEALING from your country-mother, not only one article but many things, money, pencils, lace and even a testament ! You not only steal but when you are confronted with your sins, you lie to try to get out of trouble. And then when you are caught all around, you show a spirit of defiance and show in every way that you do not care at all, except that you have been found out.

I am speaking plainly with you because I want you to know that I know just how you have acted. Do you realize how serious your misconduct is ? Do you know that if you do not break yourself of this stealing now that after a while you will become a habitual thief ? You will be without friends and companions because no one will trust you. Stealing is a crime, you know, punishable by law. You might meet such a punishment some day, unless you mend your ways at once.

I understand Mrs. Fassitt has been very kind to you during the time you have been in her home; you have been treated in every way as one of the family, enjoying auto rides, entertainments and other pleasures which they had. You have shown your appreciation of her goodness in a very poor way.

It will be necessary for the matron now in charge of the girls here, to know of your conduct under the outing and

I am sending this letter to you through Mrs. Fassitt so that she may know what I have written you. I want you to think about what I have said. I hope my letter will help you to be a better girl.

Occasionally when she has gone to
the Picture I have given her the
money, this has not been taken
out of her receipts. I cannot
tell if it is appreciated or not.

as far as she is concerned as
she does not express herself in
one way or another. This I leave
to modesty. She does not seem to
^{like to} do the little helping in our garden,
simply, she says "because she
does not like it." It is just what I
do and have done and our small
son to help, who is now ten years
old. When she is doing that she
is not doing any thing else, it is
necessary to pull ~~vegetables~~ ^{weeds and}
pick vegetables, if we wish to live
ourselves and help our country. The
very best of girls from the finest ^{schools}
and colleges in the country are doing
it, and as I am not asking her to
do it for nothing I will not pay
any attention. If she is not willing
to do this she is not worth the wages
you ask. Our house here is small
and as she does not cook any but
get the breakfast, I do not think
