Sir:

I sent your refusal of admission of Jacob Herman to the Carlisle Indian to the Farmer at Kyle, where the boy is enrolled, but he was on his annual leave. At the time when Jacob came in to the Agency to go to Carlisle, I was absent on the further part of the reservation. The Major tried to reach me on the phone when I could not be thus reached, and was himself out of telephone reach when I tried to get him; so the boy was allowed to go without the circumstances being known.

The boy lied about his age to my Clerk, when he made out his application. He is twenty-two on our census, though he stated his age as twenty.

I write this to let you have an opportunity to collect his fare to Carlisle. If he cannot pay it, I believe the amount ought to be collected from his "outing" fees.

The assistant farmer alluded to did not see Jacob to show him the letter.

The boy slipped through without any one being especially to blame here. If the boy will behave himself, I believe it would

be well to let him stay. I thought, however, after writing about him some time since and your refusal to take him, that we owed you an explanation as to how he came to go.




