

Ware, an Osage boy attending your school, submitted some time ago, authorizing this office to invest certain of his funds in Liberty Bonds, you are advised that the matter was taken up with Mr. J. L. Miller, guardian of this boy, and I am just in receipt of a communication from him wherein he states that he has now invested \$1,000.00 in bonds and is expecting to purchase \$500.00 Baby Bonds. He further states that if Elijah so desires he may expend a further sum of \$100.00 for bonds through your school, and will send a check for that amount to be used by you for that purpose. You may take this matter up with Elijah and write Mr. Miller direct accordingly.

IN THE MATTER OF THE GUARDIANSHIP OF ELIJAH N. WARE, A MINOR.

ORDER AUTHORIZING GUARDIAN TO PLACE MINOR
IN SCHOOL.

Now on this ²⁸~~29~~ day of ^{Oct}~~September~~, 1917, this matter

coming regularly on for hearing upon the petition of J. Geo. Wright, Superintendent of Osage Indian Agency, for an order of the Court authorizing and directing J. L. Miller, as guardian of the estate of Elijah N. Ware, minor, Osage Allottee No. 718, to transport and place said minor in school at Carlisle Indian School, at Carlisle, Penn., and make the necessary expenditures for such transportation and schooling out of the funds in his hands belonging to the estate of said minor; said petitioner appearing by his duly authorized representative, A. T. Woodward, and said J. L. Miller, guardian, appearing in person, and the Court, being fully advised in the premises, finds that all of the statements and allegations contained in said petition are true; that said minor has acquired the habit of running away from school, and should be placed in a school where he will receive proper training and discipline for a term of years; that the Carlisle Indian School is a proper place where such training can be given and said minor cared for the year round; that Edith Ware, mother of said minor, has made written application for the enrollment of said minor at Carlisle, and that it would be for the best interest of said minor that he be placed in said Carlisle Indian School for a term of five years, and the expense of his transportation and schooling be paid by said guardian out of the estate of said minor.

WHEREFORE, Said J. L. Miller, as guardian of the estate of said Elijah N. Ware, minor, be, and he hereby is, authorized and directed to transport said minor to Carlisle, Penn., and there duly enroll him as a student in Carlisle Indian School, for a term of five years, and the pay the expenses of such transportation and schooling out of the funds in his hands belonging to the estate of said minor.


Dear Mr. Francis:-

Mr. Sam W. Tulk left here last night with some Osage boys to enter Carlisle, among them being my ward, Elijah N. Ware, and I presume they will arrive there before you receive this letter. This is the boy I spoke to you about when I was there the fore part of September. He is an unusually bright boy, but needs ~~disciplin~~ disciplining, which I feel he will get at your school. He, like many of the others, may try to run off a few times, but after he finds out that he must obey, you will have no further trouble with him. He is enrolled for five years.

Am enclosing check for \$200.00 to pay tuition for one year, and also check for \$10.00 for personal use of Elijah.

Am also enclosing check for \$25.00 to be placed to the credit of Joseph Ware.
