

A Papago pupil 19 years old and of special promise appealed to me to secure his transfer from Riverside to your school and after giving his case thorough investigation I consider it wise to do so.

He gave as a reason that he is a printer, by trade, and that the facilities offered for instruction in that branch are much superior in your school. The young man has worked at his trade for three summers in print shops, this summer having been spent in the shop of one of the Tucson papers, and he has made good. I wrote Mr. Conser regarding it and am attaching his reply hereto for your use in passing upon the case and for your handing to the Office as I believe his consent as well as theirs is necessary.

In order that the boy may not get behind on account of delay in entering, I am advising him that if he will pay his own fare and proceed to Carlisle, taking sub-vouchers for his expenditures, you will in all probability be able and willing to reimburse him.

Dear Sir:-

Pablo Molina, whom you were interested in getting to Carlisle, is not well and is in such physical condition that I do not deem it advisable to transfer him to another Indian School. He needs medical attention and treatment. This we could have given him here had the school here not been discontinued. As it is, I think it best to return him to you. It might be possible to get him into some hospital near his home.

Your correspondence with Mr. Lipps when he was in charge of this school, shows that Pablo had this venereal disease before he ever came to Carlisle.

Pablo will leave for his home in a few days.

The distressing information concerning Pablo Milino contained in yours of the 25th ultimo came as a complete surprise to me. I had expected EXACTLY the reverse. I thank you, nevertheless, for giving me the opportunity of further helping the boy, whether it may be possible or not; and I am inclosing herewith a letter of admonition to the young man which may operate as a tonic on him. One never knows when or whether results may be so obtained. Kindly deliver it to him unless you think it inadvisable.

I assure you that I shall regret it very keenly should the sequel show that Pablo fails to measure up to the standard of Papago excellence, and develop into a "pace setter" at Carlisle.

Dear Sir:-

I write to inform you that Pablo Moline, the Papago boy you sent to this school this fall, came here suffering with a venereal disease which seems to be of long standing. This morning, I have the following report regarding his condition, from our school physician,-

" Pablo Moline is suffering with soft chancre. Although the original condition has improved markedly, the inguinal glands on one side are secondarily involved. This condition will probably necessitate incision and drainage."

I have been much disappointed in this boy. Reports are to the effect that he has shown little ambition and has made but poor effort in his work during the time he has been here. Perhaps his condition has been the cause of his poor showing and slow progress.
