INDORSEMENT.

A child showing one-sixteenth or less Indian blood, whose parents live on an Indian reservation, Indian fashion, who, if debarred from the Government schools, could not obtain an education, may be permitted in the reservation day and boarding schools, but it is preferable that it be not transferred to a nonreservation school, without special permission from the Office. Children showing one-eighth or less Indian blood, whose parents do not live on an Indian reservation, whose home is among white people where there are churches and schools, who are presumed to have adopted the white man's manners and customs, and are to all intents and purposes white people, are debarred from enrollment in the Government nonreservation and reservation schools. Superintendents, in all cases where doubt exists as to the degree of Indian blood of a child proposed for transfer, should fully satisfy themselves of the facts by affidavits from reliable persons, which affidavits must be kept on file at the school.

A pupil who has been regularly enrolled in a nonreservation school must not be taken to any other nonreservation school without the consent of both Superintendents and the Commissioner of Indian Affairs, and Superintendents will be held to strict accountability for such pupils taken to their schools.

A pupil dismissed from school for cause must not be enrolled in any other school without the permission of the Commissioner of Indian Affairs. Full facts must be submitted with each request.

Dear Sir:

Your letter, dated September 26, has just reached me, and if it is agreeable to you, we would like to keep Richard Kasetta for the balance of this month, as we are still in the country. If this does not meet with your approval, we will be glad to send him on the first train, but if I do not hear from you to the contrary, I will advise you in a few days on which train he will leave Philadelphia.

It may interest you to know that Miss Jean and Annie Richards spent last evening with us at Port Indian on their way through Philadelphia from Atlantic City to Carlisle. We had a long talk together about Richard, and they seemed to be under the impression that you did not approve of his coming back to the school on account of it being so near to his former home.

The more Mrs. Buchholz and I study the boy the more we are convinced that the very best thing for him for two years would be strict military supervision in such a school as you have, and the less he visits his former surroundings the better it will be for him.

I can assure you that you will hardly know Richard when he returns. He has improved both physically and mentally, that is to say, that his mind has been broadened as a result of his life at Port Indian, where he has been able to get away from too much "petticoat" government. I say this for your personal edification and not as any disrespect to the women who, I am convinced love him dearly, but there is such a thing, in my judgment, as loving people too much, and a boy around the ages of 12 and 14, I believe, wants to come in contact with good manly boys and men.

Assuring you that I believe there is the making of a good man in Richard, and that I am extremely sorry that owing to my social, family, and official life, I cannot keep him with me for another year, I remain,

to our public school and She got
along very nicely and was treated
as one of the family, She visited
the Carlisle School at times. We were
then living in Schuylkill Co Pa
In Nov 1886 We moved to this place
in Va, and with permission of Capt
Pratt She gladly came with us
Our family was quite large and as
the children grew up and left home
She became ^{dis}satisfied and wanted
to go back to Carlisle, which She did
on Dec 11th or 12th 1895. For a time She
corresponded with us but We finally lost
track of Her, as She was sent out again
one time to Baltimore the last We heard of Her

As several members of Our family have died since she left, I would be obliged to you if you could give me Her address (if she is living) She was very fond of my children when they were smaller and did here share of caring for them willingly. If you have lost track of her and cannot give Her address I would thank you to drop me a line.

Your letter of the 7th inst relative to Kessetta Rosevelt has been received and I am glad to give you the information you desire.

Kessetta lived in Baltimore, after she left you, until about 1903, when she got into some trouble and was sent by the school authorities here to the Reseda Home in Philadelphia, where she gave birth to a son. She then worked out in the neighborhood of Philadelphia until December 1906 when she died of tuberculosis. Her little son was brought to the school in August 1907, and he is still a pupil here although he makes his home with an old lady in the town of Carlisle. The school clothes him and looks after his welfare, in general.
