#### SPECIAL NOTE.

This form must be executed in duplicate when a child is transferred from a reservation to a nonreservation school. The Superintendent of the nonreservation school will retain the original for his files, and the duplicate shall be deposited in the reservation school records. The reservation superintendent should send to the Commissioner of Indian Affairs his certificate as provided by law. All the blanks must be properly filled in every case.

If the information called for on any part of the blank is not known, that fact should be stated. No space should be left unfilled. Whether the parents are living or dead, their names must be given.

The person who signs the blank as consenting to the transfer should indicate his relation to the applicant by marking out the word "parent," "guardian," or "next of kin," leaving unmarked only the title appropriate to the signer.

#### INDORSEMENTS.

The laws relating to the transfer of Indian children from reservations and schools are as follows:

That hereafter no Indian child shall be sent from any Indian reservation to a school beyond the State or Territory in which said reservation is situated without the voluntary consent of the father or mother of such child if either of them are living, and if neither of them are living without the voluntary consent of the next of kin of such child. Such consent shall be made before the agent of the reservation, and he shall send to the Commissioner of Indian Affairs his certificate that such consent has been voluntarily given before such child shall be removed from such reservation. And it shall be unlawful for any Indian agent or other employee of the Government to induce, or seek to induce, by withholding rations or by other improper means, the parents or next of kin of any Indian to consent to the removal of any Indian child beyond the limits of any reservation. (28 Stats., p. 906.)

Provided, That hereafter no Indian child shall be taken from any school in any State or Territory to a school in any other State against its will or without the written consent of its parents. (29 Stats., p. 348.)

That no Indian pupil under the age of fourteen years shall be transported at Government expense to any Indian school beyond the limits of the State or Territory in which the parents of such child reside or of the adjoining State or Territory. (35 Stat. L., 781.)

The rules provide that-

A pupil who has been regularly enrolled in a nonreservation school must not be taken to any other nonreservation school without the consent of both superintendents and the Commissioner of Indian Affairs, and superintendents will be held to strict accountability for such pupils taken to their schools.

An Indian boy or girl 18 years old and over may, without the consent of parents or others, personally sign the application form on its being changed to suit the case: but in all cases where the parents are living they should first be consulted.

This form is to be used only in transfers from reservations or Indian schools to nonreservation schools.

Referring to your letter of April 12 1917, regarding the return home of Cyrus Conner, I wish to advise that so far as I know, there is no reason why this boy should return home for the summer. The expenses of the trip are great, and it often happens that boys do not wish to return in the fall. They get back and are home just a sufficient time to become interested in the happenings of the community, and it has been my experience that it is very difficult to get them to return as promised.

I would suggest that the boy be kept at school until his enrollment expires. A trip from Carlisle to Lapwai is very expensive, and I know that neither Cyrus nor his father has the money to spare for such purposes.

I am in receipt of your letter relative
to the return home of Cyrus Conner, and have to
advise that there seems no necessity for his going
home at this time. Should his father insist on

him to Carlisle. Cyrus also owes a bill of \$33.32
for operation upon his eyes and board in a Philadelphia hospital while he was under treatment there. I
have written his father about this bill byt havenot
heard anything from him. I would advise that when he
is ready to pay this bill that he send a check for
the amount direct to me.

The statement that Cyrus has not been in school at all since he has been at Carlisle is wrong.

Mr. Blair the principal informs me that Cyrus went to school regularly from the time he enrolled until January

16th when he left school to have his eyes treated.

He has not been in school this spring.

The father of Cyrus Conner called at the office and indicated that Cyrus has not been in school since he enrolled at Carlisle. The father is also very anxious to have the boy released from school and return home. I feared that this would be the case when the boy left for Carlisle, and I explained everything in connection with the work to him in order that he would not be disappointed.

I told the father that if the boy was released at this time I felt reasonably sure that you would insist that he refund the amount of transportation that was paid by your school in transferring the boy from Fort Lapwai to Carlisle.

However, I see no reason why the boy should return unless you wish to excuse him, and I so indicated to Mr. Conner. The matter is referred to you for such action as you may drem advisable.

His father has reported to Dr. Breid that he has not been in school at all.

Cyrus Conner entered on October 16, 1916 and did not miss a day in school untilk January 16, 1917. Since that time he has been out of school on account of eye treatment.

June 18. 1917. Rev. E. J. Conners, Lewiston, Idaho. Dear Sir: I have your telegram saying that you had forwarded a ticket for Cyrus and \$90 and that gou would pay the required \$60 as soon as he arrived home. I am sorry that I cannot allow Cyrus to go home, except under the agreement written you several days ago Through Dr. Breid. Conditions also have arisen since my letter to Dr. Breid making it necessary for me to dut down on the number of hoys who are requesting permission to go to their homes for the summer. A large number have left the school to work on farms in Pennsylvania and New Jersey and over 20 boys have joined either the Ravy or Army. It its necessary, therefore, for me to keep all who are here now to carry on the work of our two farms. It is possible that later in the summer I may allow some of the boys to spend a few weeks at home, but just now it is necessary for me to hold all who are here. Dear Sir:

Referring to your letter of June 8, 1917, regarding the return of Cyrus Conner, I wish to say that I have had several conversations with the father with reference to this matter, and one day last week he called at the office when Mr. Lipps was here at the time, and discussed the matter with him.

The father, when he left the office, stated that he would not have Cyrus come home for the summer, but would insist that he remain in Carlisle until the expiration of his enrollment. I feel that Cyrus is getting for practically nothing, the very best treatment that can be secured in the United States, and it is very unwise for him to return home and forego this excellent treatment.

The father promised to send the check to you, and I presume will do so shortly. The father made the statement when talking to him that he was of the impression that you wanted the boy to return home for the summer, but I assured him that such was not the case and that you preferred that he remain in the school.

About two weeks ago the father met me in town and requested that I be responsible for payment of the sum and he would reimburse me when he could get the money. This, I assure you, I refused to do. I took Mr. Conner to the ticket office in Lapwai and ascertained the fare from Carlisle to Fort Lapwai, which was almost \$70. I showed Mr. Conner that it would cost in the neighborhood of \$200 for him to bring the boy home for the summer and have him return in the fall, and that it would cost that same amount for him to have the boy excused from school at this time, for it would be necessary for him to reimburse your school for the amount expended in transporting the boy from Fort Lapwai to Carlisle.

This rather staggered the father and he saw that the carrying out of the plan indicated meant the expenditure of considerable money, which apparently he did not have at the time.

The father has purchased an automobile and is now enjoying himself, and I presume that this is a factor in the desire of the boy to return home for the summer. I see no reason why Cyrus should come, but will leave the matter entirely in your hands.

I have told the father that the boy should remain until the expiration of his enrollment, and I believe that he agrees with me but does not care to admit it.

I carefully discuss with each of the children going to Carlisle the possibility of a vacation, and showed that in all probability it meant remaining away from home for a period of three years, and if they were unwilling to make this sacrifice, I would not recommend their transfer. Each pupil agreed to be perfectly satisfied with the conditions, and their enrollment in your school was the result of this understanding.

I will not advance any funds for the transportation of Cyrus nor will I be responsible for the ticket placed for his return.

Trusting that the above gives you all the information you desire, I remain.

My Friend:

I have just received your letter of August 23. 1917, and thank you very much for writing me. I am glad indeed to know that you are getting along well and to hear that the other pupils are doing equally well. I am extremely anxious that the Nez Perce Indians rank among the first in Carlisle and I see no reason why they should not do so. This may require some hard work on the part of the Nez Perce pupils but we gain nothing except thru hard labor.

Your superintendent wrote me some time ago requesting that I send a party of Nez Perce girls to Carlisle who would make as good pupils as Sarah Monteith. I am sure that there are a large number of equally good girls on the reservation and I believe that some of them are in Carlisle at this time, and I would urge you and all of the Nez Ferce pupils to so work and act that the superintendent will have an equally good word for every one who is in school.

It is a wonderful opportunity you have to secure an education, for you are getting everything that is desired and are not being required to pay anything therefor. The white children of the United States would be delighted to have such an opportunity, but it is not given them.

With kindley remembrance for all of the Nez Ferce children enrolled at Carlisle, I remain.




My dear Sir:


