The Superintendent of the nonreservation school will retain the original for his files, and the duplicate shall be deposited in the Agency records. The agent will then send to the Commissioner of Indian Affairs his certificate as provided by law. All the blanks must be properly filled in every case.

*NOTE.—Age limits, fourteen to twenty years. Preferably fourteen to eighteen. Students must be at least one-fourth Indian, preferably full Indian. ## **INDORSEMENTS.**

The laws relating to the transfer of Indian children from reservations and schools are as follows:

That hereafter no Indian child shall be sent from any Indian reservation to a school beyond the State or Territory in which said reservation is situated without the voluntary consent of the father or mother of such child if either of them is living, and if neither of them is living without the voluntary consent of the next of kin of such child. Such consent shall be made before the agent of the reservations, and he shall send to the Commissioner of Indian Affairs his certificate that such consent has been voluntarily given before such child shall be removed from such reservation. And it shall be unlawful for any Indian agent or other employee of the Government to induce, or seek to induce, by withholding rations or by other improper means, the parents or next of kin of any Indian to consent to the removal of any Indian child beyond the limits of any reservations. (28 Stats., p. 906.)

*Provided*, That hereafter no Indian child shall be taken from any school in any State or Territory to a school in any other State against its will or without the written consent of its parents. (29 Stats., p. 348.)

The rules provide that—

A pupil who has been regularly enrolled in a nonreservations school must not be taken to any other nonreservation school without the consent of both Superintendents and the Commissioner of Indian Affairs, and Superintendents will be held to strict accountability for such pupils taken to their schools.

An Indian boy or girl 18 years old and over may, without the consent of parents or others, personally sign the application form on its being changed to suit the case.

This form is to be used only in transfers from reservations, or Indian schools, to nonreservation schools.

Dear Madam:-

I write you with reference to three of our Indian girls who have been taking training in our school hospital since last September and who now want to enter a large city hospital for professional training. For your information, I will give you a little history of each girl.

Agnes Owl, a Cherokee from North Carolina, is 22 years of age and is at present carrying the work of first year high school. Her grades for the Fall and Winter terms are 95 and 93 in English, 93 and 95 in Physiology and Hygiene, 57 in Vocational Arithmetic and 73 in Algebra.

Charlotte Smith, a Chippewa from Michigan, is 21 years of age and is also doing first year high school work. Her grades are 80 and 82 in English, 82 and 92 in Physiology and Hygiene and 53 in Vocational Arithmetic.

Leona Cecil, a Piegan from Montana, is 21 years of age and is one year behind the other two girls but is stronger in her work than the others. Her present average of all subjects is 93. She will be a strong first year high school girl next year.

The following is the statement of our School Physician, Dr. Rendtorff, regarding the work of these girls the past year,- " I am glad to hear that Agnes Owl, Charlotte Smith and Leona Cecil have made application to continue their studies in Nursing. I am also glad to say that I can recommend all three girls very highly. They have worked industriously all winter and have shown a keen interest in their work. Their general behavior has been of the best. "

I will add that all these girls came to Carlisle from their distant homes, for this special training. They know what they want and have bent all their energies towards getting it. They are exceptionally nice girls, pleasing in appearance <sup>and</sup> in manners and I take great pleasure in recommending them to you as applicants for your training school.

Should you have openings in your hospital for the three or for one, I will be glad to hear from you. These girls want to <sup>but</sup> begin work September 1st would go at any time there was an opening, rather than miss their opportunity.

All three of these girls are high class people. Agnes and Charlotte are one year ahead of Leona. Their grades for the fall and winter terms are as follows:

From this, you will see that Agnes is the better of the two, as regards capacity for "getting away" with academic work, although Agnes is inclined to be weak in mathematics, *while Charlotte is weak*.

These two girls have at present first year high school standing, on the basis of the organization of the public schools. Next year, they could take up some subjects in second year high school, especially English.

*24 yrs -*  
Leona Cecil is, I believe, the strongest of these three girls in every way. As above stated, she is one year behind Agnes and Charlotte, but her work has showed up in better form, and had we known just what she was able to do, we might have put her in the same class with them. When she came last fall, she said she was prepared to enter Grade VII. It soon became apparent that she could do better than that. At Christmas, we put her into Grade VIII, and her grades for the term ending February 14 showed her to be leading the class, even although she had been there only a few weeks. Her average of all subjects studied is about 93.

She will be a strong first year high school student for next year. She could carry five or six high school subjects.

I hope the foregoing is what you need. If there is anything else I can look up for you, please telephone or send a note.
