SPECIAL NOTE.

This form must be executed in duplicate when a child is transferred from a reservation to a nonreservation school. The Superintendent of the nonreservation school will retain the original for his files, and the duplicate shall be deposited in the reservation school records. The reservation superintendent should send to the Commissioner of Indian Affairs his certificate as provided by law. All the blanks must be properly filled in every case.

If the information called for on any part of the blank is not known, that fact should be stated. No space should be left unfilled. Whether the parents are living or dead, their names must be given.

The person who signs the blank as consenting to the transfer should indicate his relation to the applicant by marking out the word "parent," "guardian," or "next of kin," leaving unmarked only the title appropriate to the signer.

INDORSEMENTS.

The laws relating to the transfer of Indian children from reservations and schools are as follows:

That hereafter no Indian child shall be sent from any Indian reservation to a school beyond the State or Territory in which said reservation is situated without the voluntary consent of the father or mother of such child if either of them are living, and if neither of them are living without the voluntary consent of the next of kin of such child. Such consent shall be made before the agent of the reservation, and he shall send to the Commissioner of Indian Affairs his certificate that such consent has been voluntarily given before such child shall be removed from such reservation. And it shall be unlawful for any Indian agent or other employee of the Government to induce, or seek to induce, by withholding rations or by other improper means, the parents or next of kin of any Indian to consent to the removal of any Indian child beyond the limits of any reservation. (28 Stats., p. 906.)

Provided, That hereafter no Indian child shall be taken from any school in any State or Territory to a school in any other State against its will or without the written consent of its parents. (29 Stats., p. 348.)

That no Indian pupil under the age of fourteen years shall be transported at Government expense to any Indian school beyond the limits of the State or Territory in which the parents of such child reside or of the adjoining State or Territory. (35 Stat. L., 781.)

The rules provide that—

A pupil who has been regularly enrolled in a nonreservation school must not be taken to any other nonreservation school without the consent of both superintendents and the Commissioner of Indian Affairs, and superintendents will be held to strict accountability for such pupils taken to their schools.

An Indian boy or girl 18 years old and over may, without the consent of parents or others, personally sign the application form on its being changed to suit the case but in all cases where the parents are living they should first be consulted.

This form is to be used only in transfers from reservations or Indian schools to nonreservation schools.

SPECIAL NOTE

This form must be returned to the district agent in duplicate when a child is transferred from a reservation to a nonreservation school. The Superintendent of the nonreservation school will retain the original for his use and the duplicate will be deposited in the reservation school records. The nonreservation superintendent should send to the Commissioner of Indian Affairs a duplicate as provided by law. All the blanks must be properly filled in every case. If the information called for on any part of the blank is not known, that part should be stated. The space should be left blank. Wherever the parents are living or dead, that notice must be given. The person who has the blank as concerning to the transfer should indicate his relation to the applicant by marking out the word "parent," "grandfather," or "next of kin," having indicated only the title appropriate to the person.

My dear Mrs. Harwood:

I have your letter saying that your boys, William and Paul, are anxious to return to Carlisle, but owing to an attack of Appendicitis, which William has had, you doubt the advisability of his return. It seems to me that you and William should decide what to do, but, to help you, I might add that, should he return to Carlisle and have a recurrence of his trouble, we have every convenience for taking care of him and can get the best of medical attention for him. We have been able to take care of, in our own little hospital, some very bad cases of Appendicitis. If an operation were necessary and you would feel better satisfied that he have the attention of a Specialist, it would be an easy matter to send him to Philadelphia where we can have such operations done free of cost, the only expense being the board at the Hospital.

I hope that you may decide soon, what should be done in William's case, as if he should return to Carlisle he should do so as soon as possible so as not to miss any more school.



VACATION REQUEST FOR PUPIL.

We, the undersigned, respectfully request that leave of absence be granted *to our sons*
William Harwood and Paul Harwood.
 from *the 1st of June 1917* to *on or about Oct-15, 1917* to
 enable *them* to visit *their* home. We hereby agree to pay all expenses, including
 round-trip railroad fares, sleeping-car fares, meals, lodging, stage fares, telegraph and telephone messages,
 and other incidental expenses connected with the visit. We further agree that said pupil shall be
 returned to the *Carlisle* school on or before the last day of the leave of absence.
 We further agree to deposit with the superintendent of the school sufficient money to defray all expenses
 to be incurred, and should the pupils, or any one of them, fail to return to school at such time as may
 be agreed upon by the parents or guardian and the superintendent of the school in which the pupils
 are enrolled, the amount of money remaining with the superintendent, necessary to the return trans-
 portation of the pupil or pupils so neglecting to return, shall be forfeited to the Government; provided,
 however, that in all cases where it can be shown that there were justifiable reasons for the failure of the
 return of the pupil the forfeiture of the funds shall not take place.

If the pupil neglecting to return is from a reservation, the superintendent of the reservation shall

I am enclosing a check for \$50 from Paul's account. It seems the money sent by your parents was all placed to his credit so you will have to send this check to Paul and have him sign his name on the back before you can get it cashed.

You can return to the school and start for your home from here, when you have finished at the ship yards.
