SPECIAL NOTE.

This form must be executed in duplicate when a child is transferred from a reservation to a nonreservation school. The Superintendent of the nonreservation school will retain the original for his files, and the duplicate shall be deposited in the reservation school records. The reservation superintendent should send to the Commissioner of Indian Affairs his certificate as provided by law. All the blanks must be properly filled in every case.

If the information called for on any part of the blank is not known, that fact should be stated. No space should be left unfilled. Whether the parents are living or dead, their names must be given.

The person who signs the blank as consenting to the transfer should indicate his relation to the applicant by marking out the word "parent," "guardian," or "next of kin," leaving unmarked only the title appropriate to the signer.



## INDORSEMENTS.

The laws relating to the transfer of Indian children from reservations and schools are as follows:

That hereafter no Indian child shall be sent from any Indian reservation to a school beyond the State or Territory in which said reservation is situated without the voluntary consent of the father or mother of such child if either of them are living, and if neither of them are living without the voluntary consent of the next of kin of such child. Such consent shall be made before the agent of the reservation, and he shall send to the Commissioner of Indian Affairs his certificate that such consent has been voluntarily given before such child shall be removed from such reservation. And it shall be unlawful for any Indian agent or other employee of the Government to induce, or seek to induce, by withholding rations or by other improper means, the parents or next of kin of any Indian to consent to the removal of any Indian child beyond the limits of any reservation. (28 Stats., p. 906.)

*Provided*, That hereafter no Indian child shall be taken from any school in any State or Territory to a school in any other State against its will or without the written consent of its parents. (29 Stats., p. 348.)

That no Indian pupil under the age of fourteen years shall be transported at Government expense to any Indian school beyond the limits of the State or Territory in which the parents of such child reside or of the adjoining State or Territory. (35 Stat. L., 781.)

The rules provide that—

A pupil who has been regularly enrolled in a nonreservation school must not be taken to any other nonreservation school without the consent of both superintendents and the Commissioner of Indian Affairs, and superintendents will be held to strict accountability for such pupils taken to their schools.

An Indian boy or girl 18 years old and over may, without the consent of parents or others, personally sign the application form on its being changed to suit the case but in all cases where the parents are living they should first be consulted.

This form is to be used only in transfers from reservations or Indian schools to nonreservation schools.

That boy also Wm. Anderson boys are baptized Catholics, and if they knew their holy faith would not discard it for all the human founded faiths between here and there.

I do not know whether you are a Catholic or not. You Catholics can be saved by keeping God's ten commandments.

Catholics also, but in addition must openly profess their faith, go to confession and communion while on earth, or go to hell, when they meet their creator & judge. for Jesus Christ says unless you eat my flesh & drink my blood you shall not have life in you. John VI Chapter.

Please sir give this matter a little attention and we will have fewer Protestant Indians when they return from Carlisle.



Dear Mr. Francis:

I am inclosing letter of Frank B. Racine requesting that his son Henry F. Racine who is in your school, be excused for summer vacation. And I am inclosing a check drawn on his bank account held in trust by this Office, in the amount of \$129.30, one twenty-nine dollars, and thirty cents. ~~This~~ amount Frank Racine advises to be sufficient to pay his transportation home, and leave on deposit sufficient amount to guarantee his return, and to give him \$15.00, fifteen dollars, for the purchase of a suit of clothes. You should have Henry endorse the check and handle in the proper manner for purpose above mentioned.

Mr. Racine seems to be very anxious for the return of his son for the summer vacation, stating that he will be a great help to him and that he will be returned next fall for the school term. If there is no good reason for not excuseing Henry for this vacation I would approve of his return for the reason mentioned by his father.
