My dear Mr. Matlack:

I have received your letters of June the 30th and July the 2nd, respectively. I am glad to know the Pawnee boys arrived home safely and that they made such a favorable impression. If they can only be induced now to follow Clyde Roam Chief's example and to go to work, I am sure that they will be a further credit to themselves and to Carlisle.

Our banker, Mr. Miller, has been asked to send Clyde's money to him and the usual course will be followed.

I regret to hear that John Simpson has died and that Simon Fancy Eagle does not seem to be regaining his strength. I hope, however, that Simon will not despair and that he will make further efforts to build up his weakened body. I am also sorry to know that your little son, my namesake, has not been well. I hope he will show continued improvement and that he will grow up into a fine large boy. I extend my very best wishes for the little fellow.

I had heard about your daughter's difficulty in

connection with her detail to the school laundry. I have also investigated the matter and have given instructions for those in charge of the girls to be patient with her. She is large for her age and rather slow in her movements, but the girl seems willing enough to learn how to work and I am sure that there will be a decided improvement in her report on industry if a sufficient amount of patience and tact is exercised in her behalf. These rather hot summer months are trying to everyone, but as Cecelia will be detailed to another department before very long, I am sure that she will have no other complaint to make. I will be glad to hear from you in regard to similar matters and to have your cooperation in doing what may be deemed best for our Pawnee boys and girls.

Let me hear from you in regard of the matter, I saw the report of my daughter and I see she was poor in industry, she said, she don't get along well in the

my daughter is now 15 years old, and she
is a big girl, and wish you go slow
with her, please do not punished her
right away, go slow with her, or else sent
her home for her punishment, she never
work in her life, but she can learn as
she grows older. Now Mr. Friedman take the
matter up for me as a brother in Mason;

The Pawnee children arrived alright, and they are looking fine and good many of them seemed lost. Clyde Roam Chief jumped right in to work. I have just heard that one of the boys who got sick at Carlisle died today, he has been sick for a long time. John Simpson died today, and he was a good boy while at Carlisle, and I think Simon Saulty Eagle will never recover his sickness, he is very low. All others looked strong and healthy, I saw Arthur Coors today, and he is a fine specimen from Carlisle, besides myself (Jolt). Friedman Matlaco has been sick on account of hot weather, but he is getting

better. How is my daughter getting along there are but two Paume girls there now Alice Morris^d and Cecilia Matlack, and I hope all will return back to school again in the Fall. I suppose you have already received my letter in telling you something about my daughter, she is little discouraged with some employes there at the Laundry but have written to her, asking her that she had to obey the instructors. I'll give my regards to my friends at Carlisle, Mr. and Mrs. Nori, also Denny's. Keep ~~tot~~ lot of regards for Mrs. Friedman^d and to yourself.
