INDIAN STUDENTS AS WORKERS.

In Demand as Mechanics and Farmers
—Carlisle Outing System.

According to M. Friedman, superintendent of the United States Indian School at Carlisle, Pa., Indian students from the Carlisle School are in great demand in the East as mechanics and farmers. There are now 266 boys and 213 girls away from the school, at work. They are scattered throughout Pennsylvania, New Jersey, Delaware, New York, and Maryland.

Most of the requests for students, he says, come from persons who have had the students in previous years, or from those who have heard of the satisfaction they have given elsewhere. Recently a prominent artist of New York city, in writing for a boy for his summer home and farm, said:

Several years ago, Dr. George Bird Grinnell, Dr. Charles Eastman, and I visited many of the homes where Indian help was employed, for *Harper's Magazine*, and, of over fifty places we visited, we found only one place where there was any dissatisfaction.

The recent development, during Superintendent Friedman's administration at Carlisle, of the outing system, whereby the young men are found employment at the mechanical trade which they have been following while at the school, has attracted attention throughout the country. The plan has as its central idea the bridging of the chasm between the time of finishing school and beginning the work of gaining a livelihood, as well as aiming to acquaint young men with industrial conditions and processes as practised in the world of building and manufacture.

The girls work in households where the home conditions are found to be of the best, and where they receive careful training in good housekeeping and civilization. They really become part of the family, acquire civilized habits and customs, and experience such an industrial and mental awakening as no school could possibly teach them. Besides, they earn wages, half of which is saved. Last year the Indian boys and girls at the Carlisle School earned \$27,000. At present they have to their credit in the school bank, drawing interest, \$40,000.

The Carlisle Outing System is managed by a Sioux Indian, Mrs. Nellie R. Denny, who is a graduate of the school.

Many an Indian comes to Carlisle, uneducated, and without a penny, and, after a period of three or five years at the school, returns to his home with a practical education and a bank account of four or five hundred dollars with which to make his start in life.

Carlisle Graduates Visit Schoolmates.

Mr. and Mrs. Wallace Denny, of Carlisle, Pa., were in the city Thursday and Friday, the guests of Mrs. Laura Pedrick. Mr. and Mrs. Denny are interested in the Carlisle Indian school and are graduates from that institution. Their mission is to visit old graduates and see what they are doing and how near they follow the instructions given them in the school. Mrs. Pedrick is one of the first graduates from the Carlisle school. Mr. and Mrs. Denny have been all through the northern states visiting the homes of the Indian graduates. Their report is very pleasing as they find that while they often pick up the shawl and blanket, they are good housekeepers, good cooks and have many of the lessons taught them in the school, and are making good use of them. Mrs. Pedrick aided them in locating the old students and showing them the difference in the Indians who have never attended school and the ones who have graduated. On account of the good that the school has done the Indian, Mr. and Mrs. Denny have found their trip very pleasant and interesting.—Anadarko, Okla., Daily Tribune, October 7, 1910.

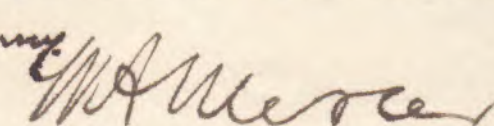

Carlisle girls as trained nurses.

Of the twenty or more Carlisle girls who have graduated as nurses, I give below the names of those who have made exceptionally good records.

Charlotte Harris, a Cherokee, and a graduate of the class 1902, Carlisle, also a graduate of the Jefferson Hospital, Philadelphia, has practised in Philadelphia and vicinity, constantly since her graduation. She is making an excellent record.

Alice Heater, Class 1905, Carlisle, also graduated from the Jefferson Hospital, Class 1908. She also completed a post graduate course in the Philadelphia Hospital for contagious diseases. For two years after her graduation, she practised in Philadelphia, earning \$25 a week. Just a year ago, she went west and is now located in San Francisco, "where I have done equally as well as in Philadelphia" she says. "I earn from \$25 to \$30 a week here. For a young woman who has to make her own living, I think she could not choose a better profession than that of a nurse." Miss Heater's record is excellent.

Another Carlisle girl who is making a good record in her profession, is Estaiene Depoltquostangue, a Kicka-

poo Indian, who graduated from the Lakeside Hospital, Cleveland, Ohio. Immediately after her graduation, she was placed in charge of one of the wards in the same hospital, which required much responsible work.

Rose Nelson Van Wie, Class 1903, Carlisle, is another nurse, who up until her marriage, a few months ago, practised her profession most successfully. She graduated from the City Hospital, Worcester, Mass. She is now located in Branford, Conn. where her husband is in business.

Another Carlisle graduate, Class 1906, who has made a special success of her work is Mrs. Juliet Smith Twoax now living at 2042 W. Erie St. Chicago, Ill. She graduated from the Jefferson Park Hospital, Chicago in 1909. After her graduation, she was for one year stationed at the Sycamore Hospital, in the same city, and was appointed head nurse at the end of the year. "I refused the position, as it would not pay me" she states. "I never made under \$25 a week and often received \$35. I wish more Indian girls would take the course in nursing. I find it fascinating, uplifting and beneficial" she enthusiastically adds in a letter to the Superintendent.

Sara Peirre, another Carlisle girl, is now assistant manager of a Convalescent Home in Portland, Oregon and is making a splendid record.

We find other Carlisle girls who have graduated as nurses located as follows:

Nancy Seneca, a graduate of the Medico-Chi

Hospital, is now in the Indian Service at Rapid City, S. D. She has been in the Service most of the time since her graduation.

Theodora Davis is at the St. Joseph's Hospital, St. Paul, Minn. making a good record.

Lilian Wind, a graduate of the Training School for Nurses, Hartford, Conn. is still practising most successfully in New England.

Elizabeth Wind Diven, her sister, graduated from the Methodist Hospital, Philadelphia, Pa. and has made use of her training to advantage.

Hattie Jamison, had her training at the Waterbury, Conn. Hospital and is now stationed at the Emergency Hospital, Warren, Pa. as is also her cousin Geneva Jamison, another Carlisle girl.

Geneva Jamison - Savannah Beck, another graduate, though she had no training outside of that given in our school hospital, is practising in West Chester and vicinity and is making a most excellent record.

Nancy Wheelock Williams, Zippa Motoxen Schanandore, Phebe Howell, Jennie Wasson Coddington, Julia Long Rames, are other trained nurses who up until the time of their marriage were excellent nurses.

Some of our best nurses have died. Nancy Cornelius, an Oneida, was the first Carlisle girl to get a nurse's diploma. She was the pioneer Indian nurse and was most excellent in her profession.



Katie Grindrod, a graduate of the Class 1889, Carlisle, and also of the Women's Hospital, Philadelphia, was an excellent nurse during her life time.

Seichu Atsye, the only Pueblo trained nurse, also graduated from the Women's Hospital and did excellent work.

Delia Randall graduated from a New Haven, Conn. Hospital and did good work.

There are many other Carlisle girls who took partial trainings in different hospitals and made splendid use of their training.

Dear Mrs. Denny:

Referring to my recent letter to you with reference to your application for patent in fee for your allotment, the blanks for which I forwarded to Superintendent Mossman from Brule Agency on the 10th inst., that he might fill in the proper description, with the number of your allotment, and sign as a member of the Competency Board and forward same to me here that I might mail it to you at Carlisle for your signature, you are advised that I am just in receipt of the application, in duplicate, from Superintendent Mossman, and forward it to you for your signature where indicated thereon. Please sign the duplicate application and return to me here at Washington, D. C., c/o Interior Department, at your earliest convenience, that I may complete the records and submit it for Departmental action.

Your age, as shown on the records, has been inserted, and the degree of blood -- one-half Indian. Please advise me when you return the application what valuation you place upon your allotment, either as a whole, or a certain price per acre.

Our Competency Board pass only upon allotments; not upon inherited lands, such being passed upon and adjusted by the Superintendents of the respective reservations.

Please give me Mr. Denny's name in full, the date of your marriage, and the number of children; also show the period you have been at Carlisle, first as a pupil, and later as an employee, and the salaries you and your husband are each now receiving, that I may thus be enabled to report upon your competency for patent in fee, which is based upon the competency of allottees to transact their own business affairs intelligently.

I came to Carlisle as a pupil in November 1880. I graduated in June 1890, having remained at this school all but three years of that time, this time being spent at my home. From 1890 to 1896, I attended white schools, graduating from a Pennsylvania Normal School in 1896.

In July 1896, I received an appointment as teacher here and have been employed steadily here ever since, with the exception of two years when I was keeping house. I was given a clerk's position in 1900 which I still hold at a salary of \$1000 per annum.

On June 12, 1907, I was married to Wallace Denny, who holds the position of Assistant Disciplinarian at this school, salary \$800 per annum and we have one little boy.

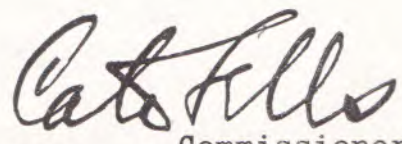

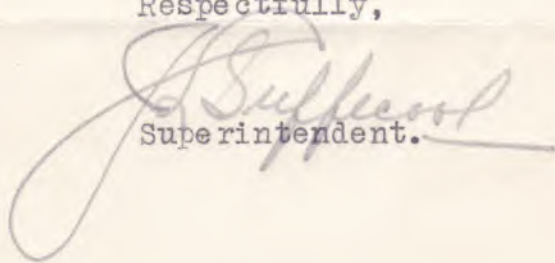

My dear Mr. Davis:

This morning Mrs. Nellie R. Denny, an employee in my office and a Sioux Indian, came to me and asked me when she should pay revenue tax. She and her husband, a full blood Oneida Indian employed as a disciplinarian here, were under the impression that arrangements were being made for them to pay their revenue tax through the channels of the Indian Service. Their misunderstanding was due, I think, to a statement made by me to Mrs. Denny that I had heard that I, as a United States Disbursing Officer, would have to report to you each employee earning over \$800. a year.

I have been formally advised by the Commissioner of Indian Affairs that it will not be necessary for us to report said employees, but Mrs. Denny was depending upon me to advise her when to pay her taxes, and even suggested this morning that she make a check to me for it.

I had Mr. Denny go before the local Revenue Agent this afternoon and make a return, and I hope that no penalty will be enforced in their case, as I feel personally responsibility in the matter as I notified all of the other employees of the school drawing larger salaries, but failed to combine the salaries of herself and husband and watch out that

they made a return.

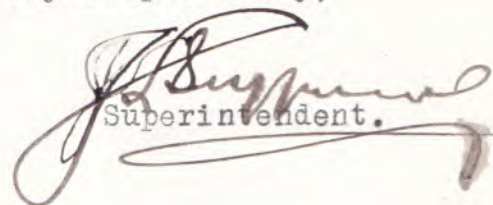
