Referring to your favor of January the 25th, this is to state that I failed to find enclosed with your letter the one dollar you desired to have applied to your subscription to THE RED MAN. I trust you have detected the error before you receive this notification.

It is deplorable indeed that three of the boys who were brought to Carlisle at such great expense last year when the money could have been used to better advantage to enroll worthier students have come to their homes as deserters, and it is only fair that they should be put to work until they have earned enough to reimburse the government for every cent that had to be expended for their trip. I would thank you to bring the matter again to the attention of the Superintendent at the Blackfeet Agency so that steps can be taken to effect the reimbursement.

My dear Mr. Clark:

Superintendent Friedman has just handed me your letter dated February tenth, relative to a class of pupils from the Blackfeet reservation for Carlisle.

I have been placed in temporary charge of the school here, and I should be greatly pleased to have you bring us a fine class of pupils.

I am advised that it is the rule of this school to pay for the transportation of an escort only when a class of eight pupils are in the party; for a less number transportation is paid only one way. It is also the custom, I am informed, not to pay incidental expenses enroute. I do not feel warranted at this time in deviating from the fixed rules of the school in this respect.

I have just written a letter to Mr. McFatridge regarding your delegation coming to Washington. I should be very glad to have you stop at Carlisle either coming or going. I shall also be very glad to arrange to meet you in Washington, if I can be of any assistance to you in your efforts there in behalf of the tribe.

Please confer with Superintendent McFatridge regarding the consents for enrollment of the pupils. He has the necessary blanks there and please be very careful to bring only good, healthy pupils, and see that the blanks are filled out and signed before you start. Have Mr. McFatridge wire me if he desires the transportation placed at Browning, and the number of tickets he will require.

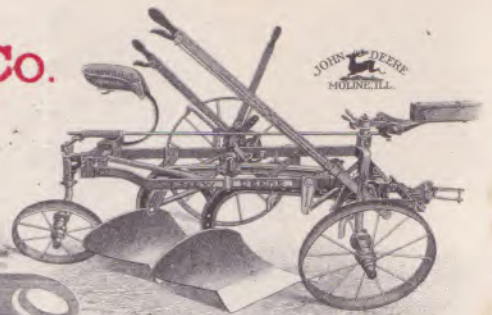
