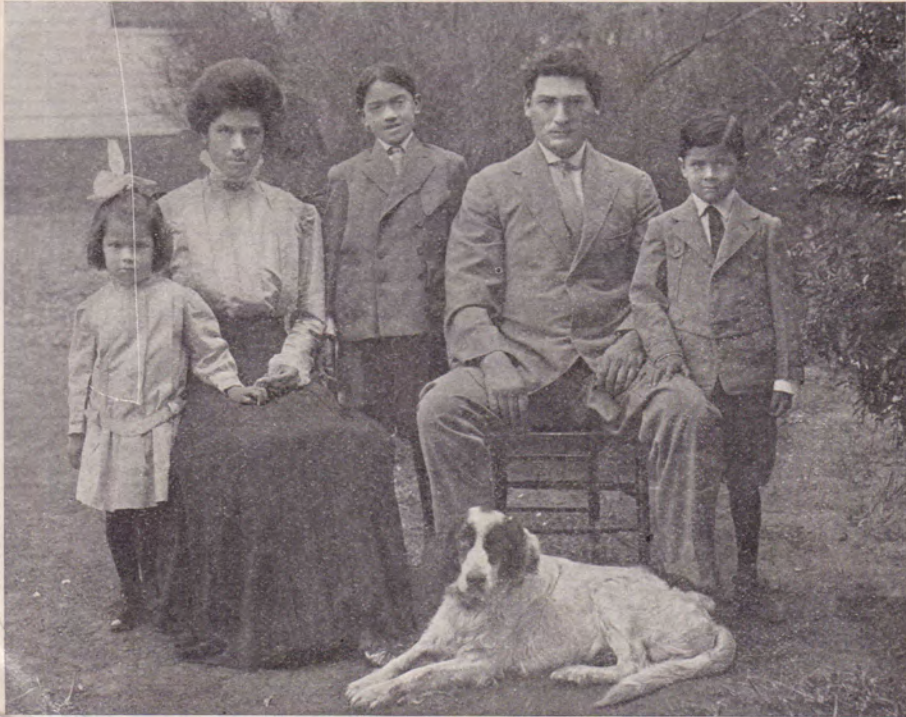

When the writer first came to Haskell Institute, now many moons ago, one of her bright-eyed, mischievous little pupils was Nora Guy, who was always a favorite with the employes. The *Anadarko Tribune* gives Nora, now Mrs. William Hazlett, and her husband, (who was a Carlisle student before he came to Haskell), the following complimentary notice in its issue of August 23:

"Mrs. William Hazlett and children left Tuesday evening for Aberdeen, Washington, where Mr. Hazlett is in the real estate business. Mr. and Mrs. Hazlett are highly educated Indians. They are both graduates from the Haskell Institute at Lawrence, Kansas. Mrs. Hazlett was taken from the Indian camps near Fort Cobb and sent to Haskell to school before she could speak a word of English. She remained in the school for six years before she returned. When she met her mother she had forgotten the Indian language and was unable to converse with her. Her every move proved that her education would be a success. Her mind was on books and the ways of progression. She went back to school and graduated where she met Mr. Hazlett. They have a fine farm near Mrs. Hazlett's parents. Both Mr. and Mrs. Hazlett have assisted in the uplifting of their race. They have a host of friends in Caddo county who regret their leaving and wish them success in their new home."


TO THE DEMOCRACY OF THE 15th SENATORIAL DISTRICT

William Hazlett, of Ft. Cobb, Oklahoma, the subject of this biographical sketch, whose announcement for state Senator for the Fifteenth District appears elsewhere in this issue, was born at Choteau, Montana, April 11, 1876, his father being a white man, and his mother a full-blood Blackfeet Indian; the lad who was destined in later years to take an active part in public life in far away Oklahoma, early evinced an aptitude for learning, which made him a favorite in the public school at Choteau; later he was sent to St. Peter's Mission, some distance from Choteau then to the government boarding school for Blackfeet Indians on their reservation near the Canadian line, where he remained for three years. He entered the Carlisle Indian school in 1890, graduating in 1895. During the years he was a student at this institution, his marked intellectuality, his splendid physique, his prowess in all athletic sports, won for him the esteem of government officials and others in high positions, whose friendship for the young Indian lad has not diminished in the years which

have since elapsed, during which he has followed various occupations, such as logging in the Rockies, a cowboy on the plains of the northwest, surveying the irrigating ditches which brought prosperity to certain sections of that country, and later in the employ of the government having in charge a pack outfit of a government surveying crew in the Rocky Mountains, then as farmer for the Indian Agency. In 1898 young Hazlett was transferred to Oklahoma, where he held a position as industrial teacher at the government school at colony, where he was married. He came to what is now Caddo county in 1899, acting as disciplinarian at Riverside, the government school across the river from the Anadarko Agency established by the government many years ago. In the same year Hazlett located at Ft. Cobb, and during the past eight years has resided on his farm adjoining the town on the west. August 6, 1901, the date of the opening of what is known throughout Oklahoma as the "new country," the Kiowa-Comanche reservation, Mr. Hazlett was, along with the Kiowas, Comanches, Wichitas and affiliated tribes declared a citizen of the United States, by Act of Congress and Presidential proclamation.

Mr. Hazlett is at present, in addition to being an enthusiastic stock raiser and alfalfa grower, editor of the Ft. Cobb Record, a paper which has contributed in no small measure to Democratic success in Caddo county.

His dealings with his fellow-men have been marked by the same progressive, enterprising spirit and consideration for the rights of others which were characteristic of his career from the time he first determined to acquire an education which would place him above the plane of mediocrity, and if chosen to fill the position to which he aspires, he will fill the same with great credit to himself and satisfaction to his constituents.
