Francis Cayou, an Omaha from Nebraska, who was graduated in 1896, and was a very fast man on the track, also playing football, is now making a success as director of athletics at Washington University at St. Louis. After leaving Carlisle, he spent three years at the University of Illinois.

Aside from discussions of local football conditions, we have also heard about how they do things in the football way in the middle West, from Mr. Frank Cayou, a former student of Carlisle who is now coach of the Washington University (St. Louis) team. Mr. Cayou graduated from Carlisle in 1896, and was in his own schooldays a famous football player. Another visitor, who is also more or less of a football enthusiast, is Mr. Thomas St. Germain who paid a visit to friends at Carlisle, while en route to Washington, this week. Carlisle Indian Will Again Coach St. Louis Team

ST. LOUIS, Aug. 24.—Seven games, including tilts with Missouri and Arkansas, comprise the schedule of the Washington university football team this year. Frank Cayou, the one-time Carlisle Indian full-back, will again be in charge of the "Myrtle and Maroon."

All but two of this year's games are to be played on the local gridiron. Washington leaves home to play Indians at Bloomington Oct. 28 and calls on Drake at Des Moines Nov. 18. Shurtloff is down to play the first game, Oct. 7.

Missouri university lines up against Cayou's boys at Francis field here Nov. 11.

The closing game is will Arkansas on Nov. 2 in St. Louis.

Mr. Frank Cayou, who is visiting us this week, is a shining example of what our Carlisle boys can do. After graduating from Carlisle in 1896, he attended Conway Hall for two years and went to Dickinson for one and a half years. He was enrolled as a student at the University of Illinois for three years, then became assistant athletic director and coach there. Since then Mr. Cayou has been connected with some of the strongest football and other athletic teams in the west, his "Little Giants" football players at Wabash University several years ago making him especially well known as a coach. For the last year, Mr. Cayou has been coach of the teams of Washington University at St. Louis. 1909

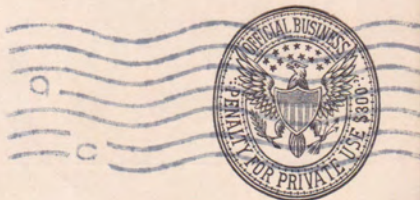
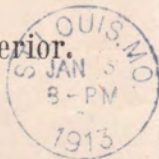
