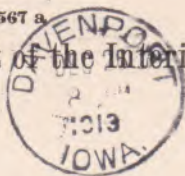

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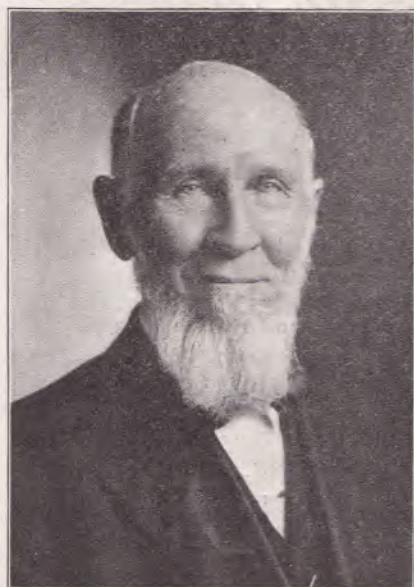

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BRIEF HISTORY OF MT. IDA PRESBYTERIAN CHURCH.

The Rev. James D. Mason, who was a graduate of Washington College, Pennsylvania, came to Scott County, Iowa, in the early part of its history. He was very active in Presbyterian work in this vicinity, having been at one time pastor of the First Presbyterian church of Davenport. He was quite active in the organization of a number of Mission churches in the county.

About 1875, under the direction of the Presbytery of Iowa City, Rev. Mason conducted some special meetings and preached during the year. At the close of the year and beginning with 1876, 30 persons petitioned the Presbytery to organize them into a church. In answer to the request the Presbytery appointed a commission, who proceeded with the organization, which took place on the first Sunday in February, 1876.

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REV. MASON FIRST MINISTER.

Mr. Mason was the first minister of the new church, which was named "The Renwick Memorial." The naming of the church the Renwick Memorial was due to a generous donation for church and mission work by Miss Rebecca Renwick, sister of the late James R. Renwick.

In March, 1876, the congregation decided to incorporate according to the laws of the state and in the new corporation the name was changed to the College Avenue Presbyterian church, with the Rev. W. S. Messmor as minister, who served them for some time.

The third pastor was the Rev. J. D. Coleman, who remained from December, 1878, until the church disbanded, May 1, 1882.

The Presbytery of Iowa City, on the request of the remaining members dismissed from the old church, organized the Second Presbyterian Church of Davenport, June 29, 1882, with the Rev. Robert Edgar as minister, who remained until 1889.

KEARNS SECOND PASTOR.

The second pastor of the Second Presbyterian Church was the Rev. W. H. Kearns, D. D., who remained until April, 1894.

The next minister was the Rev. W. Rolland Williams, who came to the church in 1895 and remained until 1897. The next minister was the Rev. John H. McArthur, who became pastor in 1897 and remained until 1899.

The next minister was the Rev. D. W. Wylie, D. D., who was called in April, 1899, and remained until 1902, when he accepted a call to Iowa City, where he is still the pastor.

NAME IS CHANGED.

The Rev. Mott R. Sawyers, Ph. D., became the state supply in 1902, and remained until he accepted the position as general secretary of the Y. M. C. A. of Davenport in 1911. It was during his pastorate that it was discovered that the Second Presbyterian church had not been incorporated according to the laws of the State, when it was deemed necessary to create a corporation the question then came up and after some deliberation it was thought best to name the church Mt. Ida, as this section of the city was rapidly filling up. The Rev. John W. Eltzholtz was the next minister who came to the church in 1911 and remained until 1912.

The building soon to be dedicated is the result of the combined efforts of every one of the men mentioned. Each one under God did his part. It is with grateful hearts that we bow the head while we send up our silent prayer of gratitude to God for the faithful who have lived and worked, making it possible for us today to gaze upon such a beautiful building.

The present minister, Rev. J. Gilmore Smith, Ph. D., came to the church this year.

In regard to your suggestion of supporting my Alma Mater will say that about the only way I know of is for me to continue living as a man here and doing whatever comes to me in the best possible way. If at any time you have something definite for me to do, just let me know, and I will do it. I hope to be in Philadelphia in November. I am going as a delegate to the American Federation of Labor as the representative of the Iowa State Federation of Labor. It is my intention to visit Carlisle at that time and get acquainted with the school after an absence of a good many years.

Mrs. Gansworth and I are planning on going to Madison, Wis., to attend the convention of the American Indian Association. We have a number of friends there, and will "hit two birds with one stone." While I have not taken any active interest in the association, I have watched the movements of the association with a keen eye, and think it is a good thing. Mrs. Gansworth is from Hull, England, but she takes a lot of interest in my people. Two of her brothers are in the English navy, and of course the present war takes up a lot of her time.

I have often wondered what became of Mr. Friedman, he seems to have dropped out of existence.

Had a nice letter from General Pratt a short time ago, and was glad to hear from him. You see I was in school during his time, and quite naturally I think a great deal of him. My little girls call him grandpa. He made us a visit some three years ago, and the girls know him and very often speak of him.

A diploma counts for nothing, if back of it is an unfounded character; a character that counts for good, upright citizenship coupled with a determination to succeed will win, and nothing less.

They say figures do not lie. That being the case it is now 21 years since I was handed my diploma, and I have been on the firing line ever since, only a few short months cover the time that I spent on the reservation and I am counted as one of the citizens of our country. I have tried to do my part in upholding the dignity which goes with that citizenship, and God helping me I shall continue along these lines.

My dear Mr. Friedman:

After having had a busy as well as a hot summer, I feel that a good way to begin the fall season is to write you a letter, so here it is. To begin with I want to congratulate you on the honor you received from the University of Pittsburgh. From the accounts I have read you deserved the honor.

(As I have not written to you several "moons" I shall begin with the birth of a little daughter in our home, which occurred last March. Her name is Noreen, and is now very interesting, and how the other girls love her!

(In June I had the honor of again representing Tri-City Typographical Union at the State Federation of Labor convention at Des Moines. Was one of the busy men there, serving as secretary of the resolutions committee and as such drew up resolutions which the convention sent to the state encampment of the G. A. R., which was in session the same week we were. Also received a nomination as delegate to the American Federation of Labor to be held in Seattle, Wash., but didn't have enough votes to carry the day. However it was a good showing for a man having attended only two sessions of the Federation. I went in company with one of the men connected in the Labor Bureau to call on the Governor, and received a very cordial welcome from him. After my friend informed the governor that I was an Indian he congratulated me on my progress and wished me success.) The union gave me \$6.00 a day and transportation. We were in session about a week. Next year the convention comes to Davenport.

(We have had a very busy summer in the office, the machine going day and night. Last week we installed another linotype, a model 8 3-magazine machine, and I am now running it. It is one of the latest models. During the summer we turned out among other work a large German catalog, and a couple Spanish catalogs. We also had a French catalog to do, but the firm we were going to do it for got in too much of a hurry for it and undertook the task, but afterwards said they wished they left it with us, for it was no easy task for them.)

I am still busy looking after the money for our church, as trustee and as treasurer of the building committee. Have had to handle several thousands of dollars, and am not through yet. We dedicated the church some time ago, but as the pledges run for three years I still have some time to go. Am still holding the reins of the Sunday school, which is no easy job. We had a contest a few weeks ago and added about a hundred new members to the school. We are now working on Rally day, and if the meeting of the officers and teachers last night has its effect, we will have a real rallyn day this year.

Our girls have started in their school work, and I have had to pay out a little money for school books. They were all promoted and had to have new books and other things.

Since beginning this letter I have thought of a plan to advertise Carlisle, and am about to ask you if it would be possible to loan me slides showing Carlisle on the screen. We have access to a lantern and lack only the slides. If you have them will you let me know? I don't like to put you to the trouble, but I remember what my father used to say when I was a mere boy: "Men miss a good many things because they don't ask."
