
It is my unpleasant duty to inform you under the conditions of the bond of your company issued to me, dated Oct. 6, 1905, and duly renewed for the next year to No. 23743-5, on behalf of Frank Hudson that, the said Hudson has defaulted in his accounts to me as Superintendent of this school in the sum of \$1410.62.

That the defalcation of Mr. Hudson only came to my notice this day by virtue of a transfer and investigation of his the said Hudson's accounts. The money was misappropriated by the said Hudson ⁱⁿ ~~for~~ different amounts and at divers times since the date of your bond, from the daily balance of cash which came into his hands as clerk.

This notice is given in accordance with the terms of your bond and as a demand upon your company to make good this loss.

Mr. Hudson is still at the school and I await any instructions you may give as to him.

Sir:

I have the honor of reporting to you that I have made a careful investigation of the accounts of Frank Hudson, your financial clerk and bookkeeper of the accounts of the pupils with the school, and who has at times small amounts of cash for the active banking privileges of the pupils at the school, and I discover that he is short in his accounts the sum of \$1410.62.

I further certify that this shortage has resulted from small abstractions from the cash in his hands from time to time during the last year. I further say to you that in a personal conversation with Mr. Hudson he frankly acknowledged that he took these moneys from the actual cash which was in his possession as such financial clerk at the school; and that there was always a small cash balance in his hands for the active use in meeting the daily demands of pupils for spending money. Mr. Hudson further acknowledged that he knew when he was misappropriating this money that it would occasion a shortage in his accounts, and also that he did know that there was a shortage.

I can say to you that from my most careful and exhaustive examination of his books that he has abstracted and appropriated to his own use unlawfully the sum of \$1410.62.

I have received your letter of December the 4th, in which you made formal application to be considered for the position of football coach.

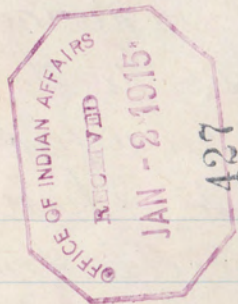
In reply thereto I must state that the matter of selecting a coach has not yet been taken into consideration and that your letter will have to be filed away for such attention as can be given your request at a later date.


Dear Sir :
