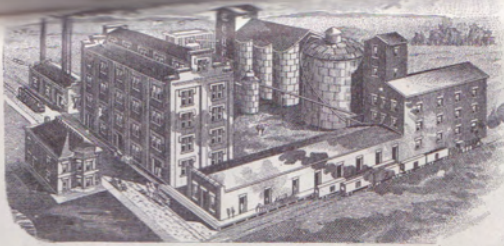
Dear Sir:--
