*I have worked among them - have helped in church work when I was on the reservations -*

*In my work as a teacher I have tried to do my work, as a teacher to teach my people to be independent. I have never worked among my home people. They are few in number and do not live on a reservation. They are self supporting.*

I have a dear little girl two years old. My husband and I will probably make our home at Astoria, Oregon in the future as he and his brothers own considerable real estate thereabouts. I think that my services as a teacher have been satisfactory. This is my fifth year as a teacher at Chillicothe.

I have been teaching ever since I left school at Carlisle in 1897.

At present I am at Chillico, both my husband and I are employed.

We have been here two years and seven months. He is the property clerk and I am one of the teachers.

With my work in teaching I also have all of the girls in physical culture.

We like our work here and I think it is satisfactory.

Rorana Smith and Betty Welch are here taking the Normal course.

Geo. Bent is our assistant disciplinarian here, he was to have graduated in '96 but he stayed out in the country instead, from there he went to his home.

Wish I could <sup>be</sup> present at your commencement, while I like Chiloco and think it a beautiful school, still Carlisle will always have a tender spot in my memory for I spent eight happy years there as a pupil.

Remember me to any one of  
class '97 who happens to be there  
also to Miss Cutter and Miss Powers.  
May Carlisle last as long as there  
are Indians to be educated, it grieved  
me to read of it being abolished.

Dear Mr. Friedman;-

I wired you to-day asking that a girl 22 years of age that wishes to enroll at Carlisle, and I trust that you grant the permission. Supt Allen wired to-day for unlimited transportation to be placed at Peever for my party, I think that I will have 10 or twelve. One point that I would like to have advise from you on before I start with this party is, that I cannot get them to enroll for more than 3 years, and if you will not take those less than 18 for that period, I will have to disband the undertaking as I am sure that they will not enroll for more than 3 years.

Please wire me before the 25th, in regard to this point as I do not care to start with the crowd they expecting to be enrolled for 3 years and you understanding that they are enrolled for 5.

Would be pleased to hear from you before I start if possible if not I will take for granted that every thing is all O.K.
