



From all reports everything is in my favor, though, and we are trying to get the government to investigate the methods of some of these corporations, which are doing all they can to enrich themselves at the expense of the Indian. Just now I am in Spokane, expecting to go to work on a salary again, but if I was only free to run my farm I could make a few thousand dollars out of it each year."

To the Alumni: -

As the time for the Commencement Exercises at the Carlisle Indian School is in order, I take pleasure in writing you my Annual Letter.
I am sorry that I did not devote a little more of my time, at least, with an occasional letter to the school, but the only excuse that I can give is on account of being such a poor correspondent. Although "Old Carlisle" is to me the morning and evening star. " It has inspired in each of our hearts the love and kind remembrance of our old "Home Sweet Home" days. It has been the air and light of our hearts.

I remember well the day I left Carlisle. It was to me the saddest parting I ever experienced, with the exception of when I first

left home.

My intention from the start was to remain in the East and complete the course I had chosen after I had finished Carlisle School, but instead of remaining to complete my course (like many others), I was discouraged by the Disciplinarian) I left for the West after a two weeks visit in Philadelphia. I will not deal in this subject, and will endeavor to give you a brief synoposis of interest.

No doubt you all know that the Coeur D' Alene Indian Reservation is open for settlement and that we are all well pleased to see the interest that is taken and are very anxious to have all restrictions

removed.

Prior to the drawing in July 1909, which took place at Coeur D' Alene City, I received letters daily, asking about the Coeur D'Alene Reservation. While a volume could be written about this valuable tract of land, and the Indians who have inhabited it, I shall only give a brief out-line as to what the Reservation is to-day:

"It's rolling prairies of rich soil, it's wealth of timber and it's picturesque scenery is enchanting to say the least. Seemingly nature has been kind to this section of the country and it's people, and left nothing undome that would add to their happiness and the happiness of those who are to follow in the procession of time. It has been my home for over twenty-three years and when I look back over the past and see the wonderful transformation which has occured among these people "The Coeur D'Alene Indians" as well as the development of this country, it seems like awaking from a dream. The wigwam and tepee have gone, and the Indian with the blanket and long hair is no more; industry and prosperity is stamped upon the face of the red man in civilian clothes, who are living in attractive homes with orchards, gardens and f fields of golden grain, and still after all these changes have taken place, I am led to believe opportunity is knocking at the door of every man and woman that will be able to hold claims thereon!" As there are many things to be carefully considered besides farming, townsites, summer resorts, undeveloped mines and mill-sites, etc., which will reward the effort set forth to secure them.

I sincerely hope that all of you who have just finished the School will appreciate the value of your training and will take advantage of the opportunities which will arise from time to time.

Wishing you all success and prosperity in all your undertakings., I hope to be remembered by all.

you ask if I know any thing of returned students I students I students I show met since my return are doing very well, and have no trouble in making a good living. I have never net any one from Carlisle in This part of the country, So could not give any omformation on return pupils from this section. I am the only one from the Cocur d'alene Vexervation. I tried hard to get pupils from Courd'alem To go to Carlisle, but there have always been a great objection you may know as well as). They are never encouraged to go out in to higher schools. There is no use of me trying to get out and speak to the Indiana about sending their children out to get a good education, for I would be opposing our Suph. Thenever the U. S. You. gets a man as Supt. on our Reservation that will work for the mitrest of the tribe we will be able to do some thing. Under the Jaresent condition we are just as a lot of out castle. Remember me to Francis Bacon. But regards to you all, and wishing you great success. I remain your friends
