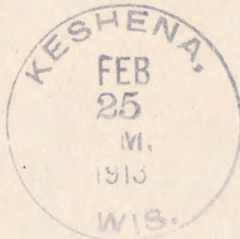

Have you been in the Indian Service, in what positions and how long in each? *Yes, Had charge of a dining room at Tomah, Wis for over one year The first year I was in the service, I then went to Mt. Pleasant, Michigan as girls Assistant Matron over 3 yrs. and was transferred back to Tomah as boy assistant for nearly two years.*
Have you lived in the East any part of the time since your graduation and if so, where, how long and what positions did you fill? *Only for a short time at Detroit Mich. while waiting for a Govt position at Mt. Pleasant. I worked at Madam Coupallet dress making shop.*

I have heard Mr. Cato Sells express himself something to this effect, that a sure test of efficiency was an employe's ability to stay a long time in one place and give satisfaction in his or her work. I also know that he believes in giving the Indian preference wherever he proves himself just as capable as his white competitor.

Answering your letter of April 17, the Office has acted upon the case of Sarah Williams Wausakakamick, and the incident is now closed.

I am sorry that Mrs. Wausakakamick did not appreciate the importance of living up to school requirements. There are rules laid down for the general welfare and employees are expected to set an example by cooperation with the Superintendent in his efforts to conduct the school for the highest good of all.

The new course of study requires that teachers like students, shall study and keep abreast of the time in their special line of work, and it is the children's right to be taught both by percept and example to obey rules.

A year ago last Dec, I was appointed
as cook to this school from the
Com. of Indian Affairs much to the
displeasure to both Agents out here
and I took it because my little boys
were here although I had passed the
matrons examination and there has been
a vacancy in this school twice since
coming here and could not get the assistant
place even when I asked for it and
it has been nothing but up hill work
for me to try and please people and
I don't think I can because there
are others that is more desirable than
I not because I can't do the work but
others want my place for the money
there is in it. Now I have been asked

to give reasons why I should be
be retained in the service because
I am not teaching the girls the
Domestic Science cooking along
with my other cooking now dear
I have 150, to cook for and no
conveniences what ever for domestic
science work and never had the
training in that time as I have
seen it taught at Mt Pleasant Ind. School
I know how to cook good plain meals
taught by my country mothers during
the summer months at vacatime time
while out yeast am I obliged to teach
that branch of cooking with out the
experience! I need my work for
self support.
