Dear Sir: Being desirous of locating my son Charles I take this opportunity of writing you concerning him.

For a considerable time now you have been sending him your various school publications and letters of inquiry. I have taken these regularly from the P.O., hoping to hear of his whereabouts that I might send them to him, but having lost track of him I have been unable to do so.

Up until a year and a half ago I heard from him regularly and he was contemplating coming home, but since then I have no word of him. I take it that you have lost track of him also and that you are desirous of locating him as I am. Therefore this letter.

My last two letters ~~were~~ from him were

Written at Augusta, Maine, June 12, 1910., and  
Glen Cove, L.I., N.Y. July 20, 1910. At this  
time he was with Jones' Bros Buffalo Ranch Wild  
West, "Band No. 1." He was in Lancaster N.Y., June  
25<sup>th</sup>, continuing through N.Y. during July, thence  
working Work Pa. to the Middle West. Since  
then we have lost track of him.

I am too far away to know anything  
of the movements of any of these bands of  
roving entertainers and so find it hard to locate  
them. I thought, perhaps, if you could lo-  
cate this company you might find him, a  
great relief to both of us.
