*Since my husband's death I have cooked in shingle mill camps and worked in a Hotel.*

*I cannot think of any way in which I have bettered my people. Since leaving Carlisle I have lived entirely among white people. I have always tried to live an upright, honest life. I have many friends.*

*I regret that I have not a picture of my home and myself and family to send to you. I am sure that the opportunities which Carlisle affords did me a great deal of good.*

12. Tell me anything else of interest connected with your life.

I do not know of any thing else that is of importance connected with my life. My husband died one year ago this month and left me with three small children the oldest being a girl of eight years. My greatest wish is to have her enter the Carlisle school. She has been in the Tulalip school since October. I made the school a visit and I find that they have a great deal of croffula there, and for that reason I dread to have my children attend that school. I have a sister, Lucy Lane who is fifteen years old who may be persuaded to go to Carlisle and if she should go I wish that my little girl, Helen Bumstead, could go with her. My brother Charlie Lane who is seventeen years old would like to enter Carlisle also.
