While there I went thro every school room and as a child I made up my mind to get a diploma from the Carlisle School and I stuck to my purpose. It took me fifteen years to do it but it pay. Carlisle has given me all my education and many thanks to my Alma Mater. Several times I visited my people but did not remain and had no inclination "to go back to the blanket". While a student I went to the country to learn housekeeping and had fine homes. Before I graduated I was one of the pupil teachers and practiced teaching for three years. It was at Carlisle that I got my good husband. Carlisle has done so much for me and may she continue to do good for others.

We are so sorry that we, my husband and I, can not be present. I should love to be there and to meet the old friends, classmates and teachers.

I should love to have Carlisle see its grand children, I know she will be as proud of them as the parents are.

We have two of the dearest children, the oldest child, a girl will soon be three years old. The youngest, a boy is just fifteen months old and is surely a lively chap for a boy of his age and size!

We are both employed here. We have the boys in our care, forty-seven in all.

We enjoy our work among these children.

Blackrock School is a small school but there



is much to be done for  
these children. We have  
nothing but Zuni children.  
In January, we had the  
measles and every child  
in school but five boys  
had it but every one got  
well, while in the Zuni  
village had about one  
hundred + fifty deaths  
and more are dying  
each day.

Well, I must close

X My husband, whom you all know so well, and I send our best wishes to you all but especially to the class of 1908, who are just about to pass from under the guidance of Old Carlisle. May success be yours in whatever you undertake in your

future work. May each one of you and as a class try and live up to the aim that Carlisle has always put before you - to be honest men and women, do the right thing and never be ashamed to do hard work as we have been taught that "Labor is no disgrace and that it conquers all things and let us not forget to stand up for our Alma Mater. All of us owe a great deal to Carlisle and let us hope + pray that Carlisle will continue and do its good work for our race. We all owe so much to Carlisle and most of us appreciate the good + success she has helped us to attain. At this

and I have been working hard for you all these years and hope each of you will prove to them that their work for you is not all in vain.

Now just a little about our selves. I don't want to talk about ourselves but we know you are really anxious to know a little about us. First, I want you to all know that we are the happiest of couple and that I have the finest husband. We are here in Juni, forty five "long" miles from a rail road. We have not seen a train since last August but we do not mind or miss it as our work takes up our

There are 11 employees  
here - Teacher, cook + seamstress  
and laundress. I am acting  
as cook + seamstress and a  
Juni woman is the laundress.

We have enjoyed our work  
among these people. All  
winter we had fifty pupils  
of all ages but most of them  
are wee little tots. Mr.  
Camfield has had his hands  
full but thro' it all he has  
been so patient with them.  
The Juni children we find  
are very slow in learning.  
The school is close to the  
village, it would be better  
if it was farther away. Non-  
reservation schools are the  
best after all.



The Juni village has about 1700 Indians and about a dozen "Americans" as the Indians call us. The Junis are very slow in adopting our ways and they cling so closely to their customs and religion. The return students are not making any progress as they go right back to the old ways and take part in the sacred dances. There are no return Carlisle students here at present. Frank Nick was the only one but poor boy he has gone to his home in Heaven. There is a boarding school for the Junis about  $3\frac{1}{2}$  miles from here. The disciplinarian there is a Carlisle graduate - Mr. Edwin Schenadoak.

Mr. Canfield is having the time of his life in the west. He thinks there is no place like the south west, he says "no more city life for me." He thoroughly enjoys western life.

I must now stop as there are other letters more interesting than mine. to be read.

Our best wishes to you all as an association, to our new Supt. and the Supervisor in charge + all other employees + friends.

Dear friend,

Your letter received asking my opinions as to the benefits I received from the Outing while a student there.

While a student I always believed in the outing and went out every chance I had.

As I come to think of those outing days, they were happy days in my school life. Why? After a winter spent at Carlisle with the regular routine of work and study - one needs a change of surroundings and come in contact with new people, and a change of life, yes and even food.

The homes we were sent to were always the best of home with the best of



people. This gave us a chance to get acquainted with the best class of people, who were interested in us and took us into the family as if we were their own children such was my outing experience.

I was with Mrs. Mander of Oak Lane the longest and to this day she is still my dear Country Mother. In fact she is the only mother I have as I lost my own dear mother, the Saturday before Christmas. I am living in hopes of some day having my Country Mother with us here, as she intends to visit her Indian children. Mother Mander has raised and trained quite a number of Carlisle girls and she treated us all the same and made us members of her family. We children are left to comfort her lonely life as she too has lost her good husband and her dear mother, Grandma Beck, as we all called her. While under mother's



care we received the best of training.

She was a good housekeeper and taught me how to care for a house, how to prepare food, she was very saving and wasted no food and naturally during this war time, I am like her, I do not waste any food no matter how small - all leftovers are saved and made into a "Hoover Hash" - such training comes in very handy in after years, especially if one has to work hard for their living.

She taught me to be neat about myself, to keep my clothes in good condition, no buttons were allowed to be off my clothes, my stockings had to be darned every week. To day, I put that into practice with my family - it is hard work to keep up the family mending and darning but it pays to do it.

I was taught that way and I want to keep up my training and pass it



on to my own children - four in number.

I was also taught the proper use of money - was not allowed to buy foolish and useless things. I bought only what I really needed and saved most of my earnings and when I went back to Carlisle for the winter, I had money to spend but not foolishly.

To day I think I am quite saving yet and we live very comfortably, we own an automobile, have a piano player and a big flock of nice pure bred white Leghorn hens and a good half bred Jersey cow ~~what~~ more does one want? besides our fine family of four precious children - two girls and two boys.

The religious side of my life was not neglected by this good woman.

I attended Sunday School every Sunday, attended Church with the family and prayer meeting during the week.



Where ever the family went, I went. I sure had a good raising while in the east and I give credit to the Carlisle Outing System and Carlisle its self. I can never thank Carlisle enough for things she did for me.

While attending the Bloomsburg State Normal School, I was still under the Outing System and again I was very fortunate to be placed in another good Christian home and among educated people. There I received the same benefits as in my former home and learned to be studious and to become a teacher. I worked my way thro that school, I worked hard to reach the goal, it sure was no play but I was bound to make some thing of my self - I became a teacher and I am still a teacher and love my work. I shall never forget my Normal days and the kind, good friends who helped me to reach the goal - dear old General R. H. Pratt, Miss Kathrine S. Bowersox, Dr. & Mrs. J. P. Welsh and my teachers at B.S.N.S.

What I learned at Carlisle and under the Outing System I am now passing it on to the young people here, as I am still teaching and doing house work.

My husband & I are in charge of a Day School here and we have thirty six children under our care.

This is a long letter and hope it contains just what you want. I am glad to have had this talk with you and now I must close.

I wish you and the Carlisle School, the most prosperous and happy New Year.
