Dear friend:-

Your very interesting letter was received several days ago and as I believe it would interest many of your friends who have not heard of you through the Arrow, for a long time, I am going to take the liberty of printing a part or all of it in one of our coming issues.

We have a great many Carlisle boys in the various camps in our country and a few already over in France and we are always glad to hear from them. I hope that we may hear from you again.

The records show that you graduated 16 years ago. There are employees still here who remember you. Wallace Denny who was a school mate of yours, sends his best regards. His wife who was at one time your teacher, (Miss Robertson) also send her regards. Mr. James Wheelock is our band-leader. Mr. Gardner and Mr. Weber are still here, and of course George Foulke.

I am enclosing a copy of a circular letter which we are sending to our graduates and ex-students regarding our school publication.

Dear Editor:—

Having volunteered in the United States Army, and being under training at Waco Texas, I must ask you to change my address. I have forgotten the subscription price, but if you will please send me the "Arrow" and a sample copy of any other paper that you may be publishing, I will gladly subscribe for both, and send the required fees after our pay day.

* I have written to some of my instructors, who were at Carlisle some sixteen years ago, but received no reply. I must rely upon the "Arrow" to supply me with the school news, and there by keeping my interest in Carlisle freshened. A letter or a post card from an old schoolmate serves to break the monotony of army life.

We have a very nice camp here, being located in the heart of the cotton belt. Waco is a fine city, having pleasant parks, nice streets, numerous manufactories and a population of about forty thousand. There are at the present, about forty five thousand soldiers here at Camp Mac Arthur.

Our camp tents are equipped with floors, side walls, small stoves and electric lights. We are obliged to drill eight hours of each day, when the weather permits. We are, however, subject to some very severe sand storms. Some days we are obliged to stop our drill on account of the heavy winds which roll the dirt and sand in almost, blinding clouds across the level surface.

We are as yet, unassigned to any brigade and therefore we do not know just how long we will be stationed here. We are all anxious to go to France.

Hoping to receive the "Arrow", I will close with best wishes for your future welfare.
