My dear Sir:

I have received your valued favor of the 2nd instant relative to your desire to have your two children enrolled at Carlisle, but must inform you that for a number of years children as young as yours are have not been admitted here because it is believed that the personal care and attention they must have cannot be given such small folks on account of the many older students who have to be cared for and for whose education Carlisle is specially equipped and intended. You are advised further that the lower grade work here has been discontinued and that this year only students sixteen and more years of age are being admitted unless it is shown that they have completed more than the usual grade of academic work and can no longer be accommodated in the schools they have attended.

It is my opinion that satisfactory progress cannot be made by little children unless they are given personal care and attention and when they have associates of their own age, and you

will probably find that keeping them in a school where they are equipped to do such personal work for small children will be to their advantage.

When your children are older I will gladly consider another request to have them enrolled at Carlisle, but at this time a favorable reply cannot be conveyed to you.
