Dear Katie:

I was glad to get your little note this morning, relative to the Arrow. I too am sorry that we cannot get more news of the returned students in the Arrow, but this is a matter I cannot help.

The Red Man gives more about the returned students, just now, but I understand that these returned student items are to be given in the Arrow, so that I think if you will wait a few weeks you will get more news of your friends, in this little paper.

The Alumni Association is considering the matter of getting up a little publication of its own. As soon as the Alumni Secretary gets enough paid subscriptions, at a dollar each, she will begin getting out this little paper. Whether she does this or not depends on the returned students, as she must have Five hundred dollars (\$500.00) before she can begin the work. I think that to date she has received about Sixty dollars (\$60.00) toward this end.
