Cumberland Valley.

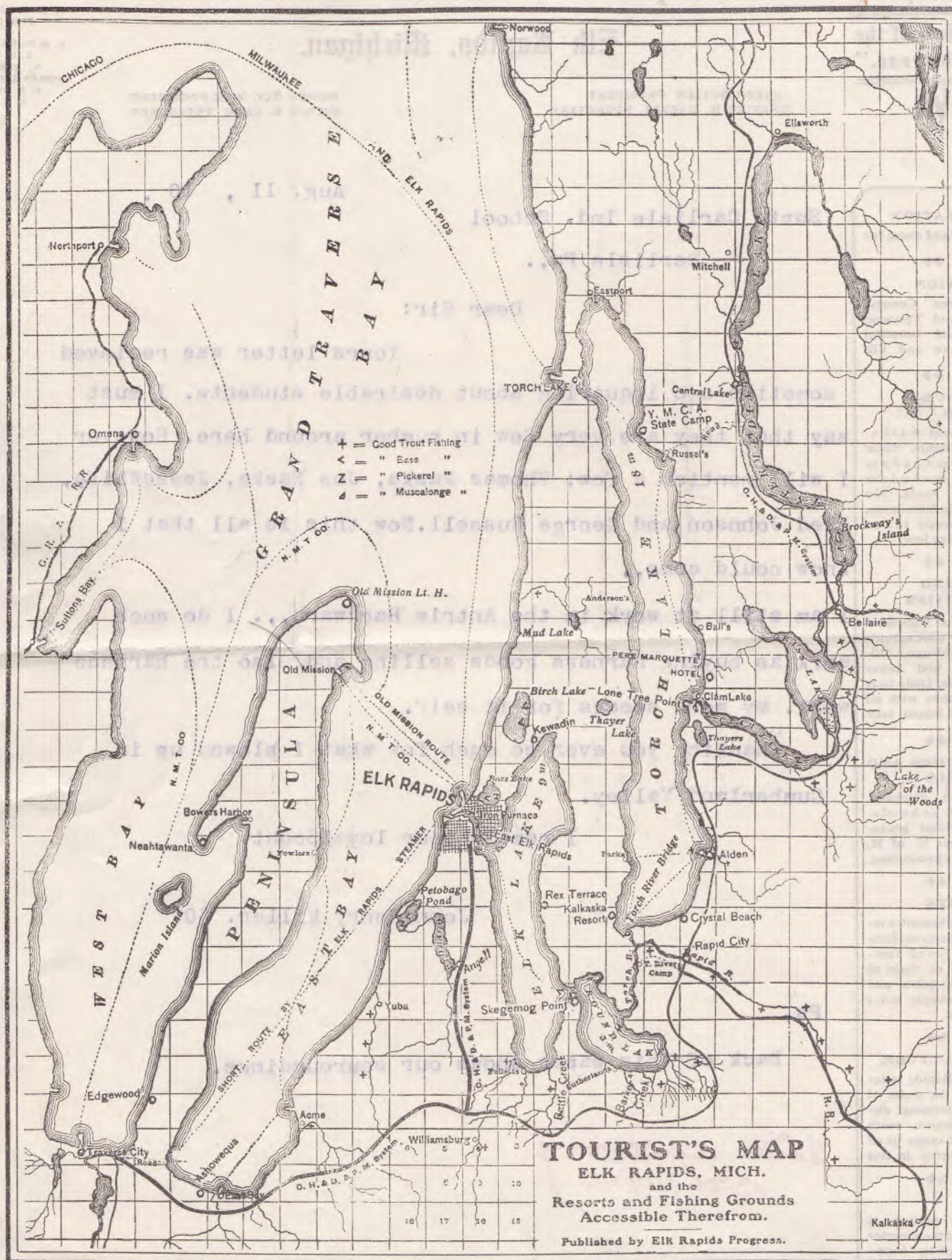

I am certainly glad that you think of us; we, who are on the firing line.

We owe to you an unlimited amount of thanks as a Superintendent of one of the greatest institutions on earth, and for your determination in uplifting the Indian Race.

True as you say, the success of the school lies in the graduates.

I will give you a little of my experiences since leaving School.

While at school, I said to one of the boys, if ever I learnt or worked at a trade while there that I would work at it when I got home.

After leaving school I came home, I applied for work in a harness shop. But being an Indian I was not given employment. So I worked

at what I found to do. Two years went by before I was given a chance. I was tried for a week, but the week lasted nine months, until the work got so slack I had to go. I was hired again by this same firm after a lapse ^{of} about one year, and my honesty and willingness to work goes to show that I have been here now going on five years. The Harness Shop is connected with one of the finest Hardware Stores in Northern Michigan.

I have the sole charge of the shop, making heavy harness to a very fine buggy harness.

I had offers to go and work two different places. But I am very well satisfied here. And I also clerk in the store.

I have been very busy lately.

The Indians and whites around here said, "what good does it do them to go to school, they only go and do the same kind of work as the rest do, that did not go to school." Very well they are all silent now to see me working in a nice cosy shop.
