SPECIAL NOTE.

This form must be executed in duplicate when a child is transferred from a reservation to a nonreservation school. The Superintendent of the nonreservation school will retain the original for his files, and the duplicate shall be deposited in the Agency records. The agent will then send to the Commissioner of Indian Affairs his certificate as provided by law. All the blanks must be properly filled in every case.

NOTE

Age limits, fourteen to twenty years. Preferably fourteen to eighteen. Students must be at least one-fourth Indian, preferably full Indian. Special cases beyond the age limit will be given consideration. An industrial course only can be taken and the term reduced to three years, in exceptional cases.

INDORSEMENTS

The laws relating to the transfer of Indian children from reservations and schools are as follows:

That hereafter no Indian child shall be sent from any Indian reservation to a school beyond the State or Territory in which said reservation is situated without the voluntary consent of the father or mother of such child if either of them are living, and if neither of them are living without the voluntary consent of the next of kin of such child. Such consent shall be made before the agent of the reservation, and he shall send to the Commissioner of Indian Affairs his certificate that such consent has been voluntarily given before such child shall be removed from such reservation. And it shall be unlawful for any Indian agent or other employee of the Government to induce, or seek to induce, by withholding rations or by other improper means, the parents or next of kin of any Indian to consent to the removal of any Indian child beyond the limits of any reservation. (28 Stats., p. 906.)

Provided, That hereafter no Indian child shall be taken from any school in any State or Territory to a school in any other State against its will or without the written consent of its parents. (29 Stats., p. 348.)

The rules provide that—

A pupil who has been regularly enrolled in a nonreservation school must not be taken to any other nonreservation school without the consent of both Superintendents and the Commissioner of Indian Affairs, and Superintendents will be held to strict accountability for such pupils taken to their schools.

An Indian boy or girl 18 years old and over may, without the consent of parents or others, personally sign the application form on its being changed to suit the case.

This form is to be used only in transfers from reservations or Indian schools to nonreservation schools.

I regret very much to advise you, in reply to your letter of December the 30th, that there does not seem to be any one here who has one good word to say for you because your conduct evidently became more and more reprehensible as chance after chance was given you. That is certainly a very hard thing to say of a young man who had the opportunities you had at Carlisle, but it is best to be frank with you.

In view of the fact that your record here was so very unsatisfactory it is my suggestion that you now see the newly appointed Superintendent, Mr. Covey, yourself and that you let him know just what you desire. That will give him a chance to determine whether you have really made a conscientious effort to do right and whether he believes you worthy of being given a trial because of what you appear to be now and desire to do.

I am advised that you have ability and that you did

very satisfactory work at the Standing Rock Agency during the Superintendency of Mr. J. Y. Hamilton while you were at your home thru one of the vacation periods. Any chance that is given you will have to be because you are really trying now to be upright and of use and in order that you can show whether you are sincere in your desire to be helped.

Through the advice of Mr. Hamilton, Superintendent of the Standing Rock, reservation I wish to drop these few lines and let you know how I am getting along out here since I left my Alma Mater.

Well Mr. Freideman you dont know how much I have repented for my conduct there at school, and now the only thing left for me to do is get down to hard work and make up for the wrong I have done by doing my part in maintaining the good reputation that Carlisle has always had in the past years, the last talk that you give me on the day of my leaving has been my only comfort whereby I can always think of that last good advice from you which has made a turning point in my life and I will always live the life that Carlisle has taught me in my younger days at that school.

So much for that part of this letter, I was lucky enough to get work from Mr. Hamilton on the 12th of this month and I have been here ever since working in the Indian Land office, but as the year is up on the 30th of June, when they send all the money on hand back to Washington, I guess I will be out of work for a while but they are going to try and fix it so that I can come back to work in about a couple of weeks, for I have not been home but only one day and that was the following Sunday after I left Carlisle, and so on the other

hand I am glad to take a couple of weeks vacation and then I can work all summer for I find my work here very interesting as they do lots of Probating over the property of the Indians and I have learn a whole lot since I have been here.

Mr. Hamilton has asked me if I wouldnt like to go and finish my education this coming fall, but I have not yet decide but I think I will go and finish my Business course somewhere the coming winter for I have made a pretty good progress in my short hand and type-writing for the short space of time that I took it and I think if I get down to business I can make good in that line of work in the near future so I am still expecting to go to school in the fall if nothing happens to me by fall.

Well I hope this find you in the best of health and I hope that these few lines of mine will explain to you that I felt a deep regret for my conduct there Mr. Freideman, I will ever try and do my part in life for the good of my race and lastly for the reputation of my dear old school, and I shall always hope for the best and the good that it has done for me and others who have realize it.
