SPECIAL NOTE.

This form must be executed in duplicate when a child is transferred from a reservation to a nonreservation school. The Superintendent of the nonreservation school will retain the original for his files, and the duplicate shall be deposited in the Agency records. The agent will then send to the Commissioner of Indian Affairs his certificate as provided by law. All the blanks must be properly filled in every case.

NOTE

Age limits, fourteen to twenty years. Preferably fourteen to eighteen. Students must be at least one-fourth Indian, preferably full Indian. Special cases beyond the age limit will be given consideration. An industrial course only can be taken and the term reduced to three years, in exceptional cases.

INDORSEMENTS

The laws relating to the transfer of Indian children from reservations and schools are as follows:

That hereafter no Indian child shall be sent from any Indian reservation to a school beyond the State or Territory in which said reservation is situated without the voluntary consent of the father or mother of such child if either of them are living, and if neither of them are living without the voluntary consent of the next of kin of such child. Such consent shall be made before the agent of the reservation, and he shall send to the Commissioner of Indian Affairs his certificate that such consent has been voluntarily given before such child shall be removed from such reservation. And it shall be unlawful for any Indian agent or other employee of the Government to induce, or seek to induce, by withholding rations or by other improper means, the parents or next of kin of any Indian to consent to the removal of any Indian child beyond the limits of any reservation. (28 Stats., p. 906.)

Provided, That hereafter no Indian child shall be taken from any school in any State or Territory to a school in any other State against its will or without the written consent of its parents. (29 Stats., p. 348.)

The rules provide that—

A pupil who has been regularly enrolled in a nonreservation school must not be taken to any other nonreservation school without the consent of both Superintendents and the Commissioner of Indian Affairs, and Superintendents will be held to strict accountability for such pupils taken to their schools.

An Indian boy or girl 18 years old and over may, without the consent of parents or others, personally sign the application form on its being changed to suit the case.

This form is to be used only in transfers from reservations or Indian schools to nonreservation schools.

INDIANS TELL WHY THANKSGIVING TURKEY IS BALD-HEADED BIRD

(Special Dispatch to The Morning Telegraph)

CARLISLE, Pa., Nov. 28.

The fact that the turkey is bald has for years worried scientists, who have been baffled in explaining the reason for the lack of hirsute adornment on the Thanksgiving Day bird's peculiar cranium. But the Indians can tell the curious person the cause of the delinquency, for it is described in a legend of the Cherokee tribe.

Nan Saunooke, a Cherokee and chief justice of the supreme court of the Indian School students here, declares that if one should chance to visit the home of an old Indian he would perhaps notice a turkey wing hanging near the fire. This the Indian uses to fan the sparks into a flame, or in the sultry days of Summer fan himself. If asked why he uses the turkey wing, he would no doubt tell the legend of why the turkey is bald, a legend preserved in writing by Miss Saunooke.

Many years ago the fire of the world was nearly extinguished, this event occurring just at the beginning of the Winter season. The birds of the air were filled with anxiety, for their intuition told them they would need heat to keep them warm through the cold season.

A bird council was held and it was decided that the birds which could fly highest should soar into the air and see if they could find a spark anywhere. The efforts of the eagle, lark and raven were in vain. The honor was left to the little brown sparrow, who spied a spark of fire in the hollow of an old stump, in the heart of a deep forest.

The birds flocked around the stump and tried to decide who should pick the spark out. But all their efforts were in vain; to their dismay they saw the spark growing smaller and fainter. The turkey then volunteered to try and keep the tiny coal alive by fanning it with his wings. Day after day the turkey kept fanning; the heat became greater each day, until the feathers were singed off the turkey's head.

"If one notices carefully," said Miss Saunooke, "he will see lumps on the head of a turkey that appear as blisters.

"Well, the legend concludes that the turkey was so badly burned that all turkeys since have had bald heads and wear the blisters as a memento of the bravery of the turkey. The faithful turkey lost his beautiful feathers, but he gave back fire to the world; so in his honor and as a memorial of his faithfulness, the Indian uses the turkey wing to make his *fire* *baca*."

Sir:-

Your Office appointed Miss Nan Saunooke a teacher at the Chilocco Indian School at \$540 per annum under date of November 15th. This appointment was by virtue of her having passed a regular Civil Service examination. She was to start for her place of duty within a few days.

To-day she received a letter which I herewith enclose from the Superintendent of the Chilocco School. This letter is so palpably unfair to this girl that I send it to your Office. The letter is clearly prepared to discourage a regularly Civil Service appointee from reporting for duty by setting up a condition of affairs which is unwarranted.

The Superintendent of the Chilocco School states first that this \$540 appointee will be placed in charge of the eighth grade, one of the highest grades in the institution, at what is, undoubtedly, one of the lowest salaries paid to a teacher in that school, and on the basis of that clearly endeavors to discourage her from reporting for duty.

The matter is called to the attention of your Office first, because it is a distinct violation of the spirit of the Civil Service regulations, if not the letter, of giving to every appointee under the Civil Service law an opportunity to show their fitness, and in the second place we have here an official, who should be in the Service because of his real interest in the Indian, who discourages an Indian because she is an Indian, from accepting employment, by telling her that he will put her in a grade which normally should be only presided over by a teacher of long experience who is paid one of the higher salaries.

I do not know anything about the salary list at that school, but I have no doubt that this salary of \$540 per annum is one of the lowest, if not the lowest, paid in that institution.

On behalf of this Indian girl, who has no one else to protect her, I desire to enter a definite protest against such a procedure. The girl, of course, does not feel that she wants to go, and I coincide with that belief, because I do not think she would receive fair treatment if she did go.

Dear friend:

I have just received notice from the Indian Office of your appointment as teacher at Chilocco at \$540 per year. To be sure that you do not come with any wrong impression of what your work is to be I write you this note.

You will be expected to teach pupils in the eighth grade to do which requires a pretty broad foundation. If you feel equal to do this work I shall be very glad to welcome you here but, unless you have the training that fits you for taking such advanced students and students of such mature years, I should hate to have you start in. You, of course, must be the judge as you have received your appointment. I should very much dislike to have you start into the work and fail for your own sake as well as for the sake of Chilocco. It occurs to me that, if your preparation is no more than what you have received at the Carlisle School, it would be wise policy for you to arrange for rather more primary work in some of the reservation schools.

Suggestions for Supplying the Information Requested on this Blank.

1. The report of Non-reservation School Superintendents should be made at the time or a little before the pupil leaves school, whether at the end of the school year or during the year, provided the pupil is 18 years of age and over, or younger, if for any special reason the pupil is quitting school permanently. As soon as this report is received, or at least very soon after the pupil returns home, the Supervisor of Indian Employment will correspond with him, for the purpose of getting more in personal touch with the returned student, and finding out something about his wishes etc. The answer to this letter when received will be attached to and filed as part of this report.

2. Health, height, and weight of returned students are sometimes very essential in placing them properly, but height and weight could be approximated very satisfactorily, though from the pupil records now being gotten up, all information called for in part 1, of this blank, could readily be secured and be definite.

3. The State, Agency, and Tribe are important, and where the pupil is not attached to any agency, this fact should be stated as "no agency," and in such cases the Superintendents should give all available information as to the home and local conditions surrounding the pupil.

4. Where the out-going pupil has passed the Civil Service Examination for any position, this fact should always be noted, giving position for which examination was taken.

5. It should be remembered that the Supervisor of Indian Employment can but seldom have a personal acquaintance with the out-going student, and that he must depend on the information furnished in this report for his basis of action in behalf of the pupil.

6. The degree of Indian blood should always be stated, as this fact largely determines the amount of efforts that will be made on behalf of any particular returned student: Qualifications being equal or even nearly so, the preference will be given to those having the greatest degree of Indian blood.

7. This report should be forwarded promptly to the Supervisor of Indian Employment, Denver, Colorado.

8. Reports on out-going students from Reservation Schools, are made only on pupils leaving the school who are 18 years old or over, and who will probably not go away to school.

9. If Part 1, of this report is made out by the Principal of the Reservation School, the Agent or Reservation Superintendent should supply information called for in Part 2, if the Principal has not the necessary information on home surroundings and local conditions. Information in regard to home surroundings and local conditions is very essential to properly understand the pupils' difficulties and needs.

10. When Part One is made out by Non-reservation Superintendents, this blank will be sent by the Supervisor of Indian Employment to the Agent or Superintendent of the Reservation, where the out-going student belongs, to have Part 2 filled out. This should be filled out and returned to the Supervisor of Indian Employment, Denver, Colorado, as promptly as possible, for, practically nothing can be done, till the receipt of this blank, with Part 2 filled out by the Reservation authorities. The information "Employed since return as follows," will be valuable only in cases where the pupil has been home for some time.
