Gets Scholarship in Dana's Musical Conservatory.

For the first time in the history of Carlisle one of its students has been honored by being selected for one of the scholarships on violin by Dana's Musical Conservatory, of Warren, Ohio. The young man whose good fortune it was to receive such an honor is a graduate of the school in the Class 1912. He returned to take up post-graduate work in the Business Department and continue his studies on the violin in our own Music Department, under Mr. Stauffer, who himself is an alumnus of the Dana Conservatory. Realizing that Fred had talent for his chosen instrument, an effort was made to help him continue his study, and through the courtesy of our worthy Superintendent, Mr. Friedman, the way was opened, and the scholarship was offered by Mr. Dana.

A card from Fred tells us he is being treated with the utmost courtesy and is very happy, indeed. We hope to hear good report of him from time to time, for judging from his past efforts at Carlisle he will no doubt be a credit not only to his race but his Alma Mater as well. His host of friends wish him every success. At the meeting of the school held in the Auditorium last Friday evening, Mr. Friedman spoke in terms of highest tribute of the work of Fred Cardin while at Carlisle, and after his remarks the school gave three rousing cheers for their schoolmate, whom they were sorry to see leave, but were glad to lose if it meant his gain.

The conservatory which he has entered was founded in the year 1868 by Junius Dana, brother of Charles Dana, editor and founder of the New York Sun. William H. Dana, son of Junius, and present head of the conservatory, was born in 1846. His musical education was begun at Kullak's Conservatory, Berlin, and continued at the Royal Academy of Music, London. He served during the Civil War, was one of the founders of the Music Teachers' National Association, and in 1880 began a series of lecturing tours, traveling over Europe and the Arctic regions.



This is to acknowledge receipt of your letter of the 8th inst. pertaining to the financial standing of Fred Cardin, a Quapaw Indian pupil enrolled in the Carlisle Indian School.

This young man was too young to participate in the first division of the Quapaw Reserve when each member received 200 acres of land, but was an infant when the second allotment or remainder of the Quapaw lands were allotted in severalty. In this division he received 40 acres of rough untillable land which does not bring him any revenue.

His father is an adopted Quapaw and received for his allotment undesirable lands which do not afford him but little revenue. He is a laborer in the railroad shops of the Missouri Kansas & Texas railway at Parsons, Kansas, and has a wife and several children to support, therefore is not financially situated to assist his son very materially in receiving an education.

Since the receipt of your letter of July the 3rd I have made inquiry shout the total sum yet available from the fund on which checks were drawn last year to pay your expenses at the Dana Institute and have learned that only a very small amount can be used this year.
