SPECIAL NOTE.

This form must be executed in duplicate when a child is transferred from a reservation to a non-reservation school. The Superintendent of the nonreservation school will retain the original for his files, and the duplicate shall be deposited in the Agency records. The agent will then send to the Commissioner of Indian Affairs his certificate as provided by law. All the blanks must be properly filled in every case.

NOTE.—Age limits, fourteen to twenty years. Preferably fourteen to eighteen. Students must be at least one-fourth Indian, preferably full Indian. Special cases beyond the age limit will be given consideration. An industrial course only can be taken and the term reduced to three years, in exceptional cases.

INDORSEMENTS.

The laws relating to the transfer of Indian children from reservations and schools are as follows:

That hereafter no Indian child shall be sent from any Indian reservation to a school beyond the State or Territory in which said reservation is situated without the voluntary consent of the father or mother of such child if either of them is living, and if neither of them is living without the voluntary consent of the next of kin of such child. Such consent shall be made before the agent of the reservation, and he shall send to the Commissioner of Indian Affairs his certificate that such consent has been voluntarily given before such child shall be removed from such reservation. And it shall be unlawful for any Indian agent or other employee of the Government to induce, or seek to induce, by withholding rations or by other improper means, the parents or next of kin of any Indian to consent to the removal of any Indian child beyond the limits of any reservation. (28 Stats., p. 906.)

Provided, that hereafter no Indian child shall be taken from any school in any State or Territory to a school in any other State against its will or without the written consent of its parents. (29 Stats., p. 348.)

The rules provide that-

A pupil who has been regularly enrolled in a nonreservation school must not be taken to any other nonreservation school without the consent of both Superintendents and the Commissioner of Indian Affairs, and Superintendents will be held to strict accountability for such pupils taken to their schools.

An Indian boy or girl 18 years old and over may, without the consent of parents or others, personally sign the application form on its being changed to suit the case.

This form is to be used only in transfers from reservations, or Indian schools, to nonreservation schools.

INDORSEMENT.

A child showing one sixteenth or less Indian blood, whose parents live on an Indian reservation, Indian fashion, who, if debarred from the Government schools, could not obtain an education, may be permitted in the reservation day and boarding schools, but it is preferable that it be not transferred to a nonreservation school, without special permission from the Office. Children showing one-eighth or less Indian blood, whose parents do not live on an Indian reservation, whose home is among white people where there are churches and schools, who are presumed to have adopted the white man's manners and customs, and are to all intents and purposes white people, are debarred from enrollment in the Government nonreservation and reservation schools. Superintendents, in all cases where doubt exists as to the degree of Indian blood of a child proposed for transfer, should fully satisfy themselves of the facts by affidavits from reliable persons, which affidavits must be kept on file at the school.

A pupil who has been regularly enrolled in a nonreservation school must not be taken to any other nonreservation school without the consent of both Superintendents and the Commissioner of Indian Affairs, and Superintendents will be held to strict accountability for such pupils taken to their schools.

A pupil dismissed from school for cause must not be enrolled in any other school without the permission of the Commissioner of Indian Affairs. Full facts must be submitted with each request.

Reference is made to your letter of April 28, 1917, in which you direct attention to that paragraph of the Declaration of Policy in the Administration of Indian Affairs which refers to Indian students who have completed the course of instruction in the Government schools, being declared competent.

In accordance with these directions
I have the honor to report that Max La Chapelle,
a 2 blood Sioux, 20 years of age, passed his
exeminations and on May 24, 1917, was graduated
from this school in printing in accordance with
the studies prescribed in the tentative course
of study.

Max La Chappile is the son of Joseph and Josephine Stelker La Chapelle of Wabasha, Minn. His father is a shipbuilder and his mother is dead.

as he was enrolled at Minnesota an effort was made to obtain some information concerning him from Superintendent Hinton of the White Barth Agency, but he advises that there does not appear from the records of his office to be any person by the name of Max La Chapelle from his agency.

Principal Blair and Roy H. Bradley, Director of Mechanic Arts, report that Max is of an aggressive disposition, fond of argument and slow to acknowledge himself defeated. That only kindness and patience can win his respect and loyalty. According to his own report he

has had a very checkered career, and has been looking out for himself for a long time. He has traveled extensively and has worked at many different activities, having been on the farm a few months, greenhouse for five months and for three years in the print shop, and he has come out of it with clean habits of thought and actions. He is not studies but reads a great deal from a wide variety of subjects. Since graduating he has gone to the Ford Factory where he is now employed.

He is in excellent health and is careful in spending his money.

This young man apparently has no property whatsoever under the care of the Government and if in thenfuture hit should be found that he is entitled to any, all restrictions upon his person or property should be immediately removed as soon as practicable.


