SPECIAL NOTE.

This form must be executed in duplicate when a child is transferred from a reservation to a nonreservation school. The Superintendent of the nonreservation school will retain the original for his files, and the duplicate shall be deposited in the Agency records. The agent will then send to the Commissioner of Indian Affairs his certificate as provided by law. All the blanks must be properly filled in every case.

If the information called for on any part of the blank is not known, that fact should be stated. No space should be left unfilled. Whether the parents are living or dead, their names must be given.

The person who signs the blank as consenting to the transfer should indicate his relation to the applicant by marking out the word "parent," "guardian," or "next of kin," leaving unmarked only the title appropriate to the signer.

INDORSEMENTS.

The laws relating to the transfer of Indian children from reservations and schools are as follows:

That hereafter no Indian child shall be sent from any Indian reservation to a school beyond the State or Territory in which said reservation is situated without the voluntary consent of the father or mother of such child if either of them are living, and if neither of them are living without the voluntary consent of the next of kin of such child. Such consent shall be made before the agent of the reservation, and he shall send to the Commissioner of Indian Affairs his certificate that such consent has been voluntarily given before such child shall be removed from such reservation. And it shall be unlawful for any Indian agent or other employee of the Government to induce, or seek to induce, by withholding rations or by other improper means, the parents or next of kin of any Indian to consent to the removal of any Indian child beyond the limits of any reservation. (28 Stats., p. 906.)

Provided, That hereafter no Indian child shall be taken from any school in any State or Territory to a school in any other State against its will or without the written consent of its parents. (29 Stats., p. 348.)

The rules provide that—

A pupil who has been regularly enrolled in a nonreservation school must not be taken to any other nonreservation school without the consent of both Superintendents and the Commissioner of Indian Affairs, and Superintendents will be held to strict accountability for such pupils taken to their schools.

An Indian boy or girl 18 years old and over may, without the consent of parents or others, personally sign the application form on its being changed to suit the case; but in all cases where the parents are living they should first be consulted.

This form is to be used only in transfers from reservations or Indian schools to nonreservation schools.

My dear Madam:

I have received your letter of November the 20th, in which you inquire so anxiously relative to a report that was made by your brother, George Merrill, that he is here this year on trial. First of all let me assure you that George is doing very well and that he and several other boys have been selected from among all our boys to assist the Principal Teacher in supervising the janitor work at our Academic Building and with such other work as can be given him in that Department.

George ran away from Carlisle on May the 4th of this year and went to an Outing home where he had formerly been located. Ten days later he was seen by our Boys' Outing Agent and then agreed to abide by the regular school and Outing rules. Later in the summer permission was given him to attend a special school in the city of Philadelphia. When he returned to Carlisle at the opening of school I had a talk with him in my office and told him that he is old enough to decide for himself

whether he wants to get the best possible benefit from his time in school. I also told him that this year no time would be wasted on boys who did not show by their attitude that they want to be helped. George evidently took it to mean that he was on trial because of his misconduct earlier in the year, and it is well that he did, because he has made as satisfactory a record as was the splendid one he made during the time of his first period of enrolment at Carlisle.

It is a pleasure to convey so favorable a report to you regarding your brother and it is hoped he will continue to make good use of his time.

SUGGESTIONS FOR SUPPLYING THE INFORMATION REQUESTED ON THIS BLANK

1. The report of nonreservation school Superintendent should be made at the time or a little before the pupil leaves school, whether at the end of the school year or during the school year, provided the pupil is 18 years of age or over, or younger, if for any special reason the pupil is quitting school permanently. As soon as this report is received, or at least very soon after the pupil returns home, the Supervisor of Indian Employment will correspond with the returned student for the purpose of getting more in personal touch with him and finding out something about his wishes, etc. His answer will be attached to and filed as part of this report.

2. Health, height, and weight of returned students are sometimes very important in placing them properly; height and weight could be approximated very satisfactorily, though from the pupil records now in use all information called for in part 1 of this blank can readily be obtained and be definite.

3. The State, agency, and tribe are important, and where the pupil is not attached to any agency this fact should be stated and the Superintendent should give all available information as to the home and local conditions surrounding the pupil.

4. Where the outgoing pupil has passed the civil-service examination for any position, this fact should always be noted, giving position for which examination was taken.

5. It should be remembered that the Supervisor of Indian Employment can but seldom have a personal acquaintance with the outgoing student, and that he must depend on the information furnished in this report for his basis of action in behalf of the pupil.

6. The degree of Indian blood should always be given, as this fact largely determines how much effort will be made on behalf of any particular returned student; qualifications being equal, or nearly so, the preference will be given to those having the greatest degree of Indian blood.

7. This report should be forwarded promptly to the Supervisor of Indian Employment, Indian Office, Washington, D. C.

8. Reports on students from reservation schools should be made only as to those who leave the schools at 18 years of age, or older, and who will probably not go away to school.

9. If part 1 of this report is made out by the principal of a reservation school, the reservation Superintendent should supply information called for in part 2 if the principal is not informed as to home surroundings and local conditions. Such information is essential to a proper understanding of the difficulties and needs of the pupil.

10. When part 1 is made out by a nonreservation Superintendent, this blank will be sent by the Supervisor of Indian Employment to the Superintendent of the reservation where the outgoing student belongs. He should fill out part 2 and return the blank as promptly as possible, for practically nothing can be done until the information called for in part 2 is supplied.

Information under the heading "Employed since return as follows," will be valuable only in cases where the pupil has been home for some time.

Sir:

Reference is made to your letter of April 28, 1917, in which you direct attention to that paragraph of the Declaration of Policy in the Administration of Indian Affairs which refers to Indian students over 21 years of age and who have completed the full course of instruction in the Government schools, being declared competent.

In accordance with these directions I have the honor to report that George Merrill, a $\frac{1}{2}$ blood Chippewa Indian, 24 years of age, was graduated from Carlisle, having passed his examination, on May 24, 1917.

Superintendent Hinton of the White Earth Agency reports that this Indian has no Individual Indian Money at his agency. He reports that he has one allotment described as the NW/4 of NW/4, Section 15, Township 145, Range 39 W 5th P.M. and the SW/4 of SW/4, Section 16, Township 141, Range 39 W 5th P.M., which he owns in fee simple. This land is covered with brush and small timber; is a

sandy loam and valued at \$300.

He also has the original allotment No.4335 the E/2 of NE/4, Section 7, Township 144, Range 41 W. 5th P.M., containing 80 acres. This was prairie land with black loam soil and would be valued at this time at \$3200. An examination of the Mahnomen County records on May 10, 1917, did not show that the title to this land was clear in the allottee and he has either sold or mortgaged this allotment under the act of June 21, 1906.

Principal Blair reports that George Merrill has considerable ability and is one of the most advanced students graduated this year. He considers him above the average in comprehension and ability to adjust himself to circumstances. He has not been altogether dependable yet after he has had a larger experience he may adjust himself to that regard. Most of the time he tries to do what is right.

Mr. Roy H. Bradley, Director of Mechanic Arts, reports that George has been very satisfactory. He is sure that he has the ability and moral stamina to make his way in the world.

George Merrill is most assuredly of the type of Indian ~~whom~~ under the Declaration of Policy should have all restrictions upon his personal property removed. He is fully competent to manage his own affairs and should stand or fall by his own successes or failure.

Apparently no legal steps are necessary to be taken in this young man's case, unless it is deemed

advisable to issue him a certificate of competency.
If this is deemed proper George Merrill should most
certainly receive such a certificate.

Since coming to Carlisle he has worked as follows: carpentry - three years; farming - two years; plumbing, - steamfitting, machine work, firing, and some electrical work. He wishes to become an expert machinist. He is at the Ford Factory now.
