SPECIAL NOTE.

This form must be executed in duplicate when a child is transferred from a reservation to a non-reservation school. The Superintendent of the nonreservation school will retain the original for his files, and the duplicate shall be deposited in the Agency records. The agent will then send to the Commissioner of Indian Affairs his certificate as provided by law. All the blanks must be properly filled in every case.

NOTE.—Age limits, fourteen to twenty years. Preferably fourteen to eighteen. Students must be at least one-fourth Indian, preferably full Indian. Special cases beyond the age limit will be given consideration. An industrial course only can be taken and the term reduced to three years, in exceptional cases.

INDORSEMENTS.

The laws relating to the transfer of Indian children from reservations and schools are as follows:

That hereafter no Indian child shall be sent from any Indian reservation to a school beyond the State or Territory in which said reservation is situated without the voluntary consent of the father or mother of such child if either of them is living, and if neither of them is living without the voluntary consent of the next of kin of such child. Such consent shall be made before the agent of the reservation, and he shall send to the Commissioner of Indian Affairs his certificate that such consent has been voluntarily given before such child shall be removed from such reservation. And it shall be unlawful for any Indian agent or other employee of the Government to induce, or seek to induce, by withholding rations or by other improper means, the parents or next of kin of any Indian to consent to the removal of any Indian child beyond the limits of any reservation. (28 Stats., p. 906.)

Provided, that hereafter no Indian child shall be taken from any school in any State or Territory to a school in any other State against its will or without the written consent of its parents. (29 Stats., p. 348.)

The rules provide that—

A pupil who has been regularly enrolled in a nonreservation school must not be taken to any other nonreservation school without the consent of both Superintendents and the Commissioner of Indian Affairs, and Superintendents will be held to strict accountability for such pupils taken to their schools.

An Indian boy or girl 18 years old and over may, without the consent of parents or others, personally sign the application form on its being changed to suit the case.

This form is to be used only in transfers from reservations, or Indian schools, to nonreservation schools.

Sir:

Reference is made to your letter of April 28, 1917, in which you direct attention to that paragraph of the Declaration of Policy in the Administration of Indian Affairs which refers to Indian students who have completed the course of instruction being declared competent.

In accordance with these directions I have the honor to report that Herman Kelly, a 3/4 blood Oneida, 20 years of age, passed his examinations and on May 24, 1917, was graduated from this school in printing in accordance with the old course of study.

Herman is the son of William and Electa Hill Kelley of West De Pere, Wis. His father is a farmer and both parents have a good common school education.

Superintendent Hart reports, in a letter dated May 11, 1917, that Herman Kelley has no real estate on the Oneida Reservation and no personal property of which he has knowledge.

Principal Blair and Mr. R.H. Bradley, Director of Mechanic Arts, report that Herman is weak in academic studies, especially in English. He is faithful and industrious but his vocabulary is exceedingly limited which makes his speech more or less halting. He is careful about his personal appearance, very courteous in manner and speech, and always obedient to the rules. Herman's health is good and he is careful in spending money. He

is now employed at the Ford Factory in Detroit.

Herman is amply able to manage his own affairs and any restrictions against his person or property should be removed promptly.

Reference is made to your letter of April 28, 1917, in which you direct attention to that paragraph of the Declaration of Policy in the Administration of Indian Affairs which refers to Indian students over 21 years of age and who have completed the full course of instruction in the Government schools being ~~deemed~~ competent.

In accordance with these directions I have the honor to report that Herman Kelly, a $\frac{1}{2}$ blood Oneida Indian, 20 years of age, will be graduated from Carlisle School, if he passes his examination, on May 24th.

Superintendents Hart reports, in a letter dated May 11, 1917, that Herman Kelly has no real estate on the Oneida Reservation and no personal property of which he has knowledge.

Principal Blair reports that Herman is not strong in his use of the English language, but that he is a boy with determination and energy. He considers him thoroughly able to compete

with the average American boy. He considers him slow and deliberate in his movements and not particularly good in academic work. Roy H. Bradley, Director of Mechanic Arts, feels that Herman has not had sufficient training in printing to earn a living but believes that he is both physically and mentally ~~capable~~ to make his way in the world.

I feel, however, that he is a young man fully capable of managing his own affairs and such steps as may be practicable to declare the competency of this young man should be taken at once.

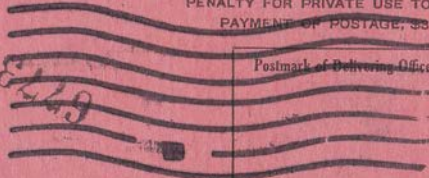


