INDORSEMENT.

A child showing one-sixteenth or less Indian blood, whose parents live on an Indian reservation, Indian fashion, who, if debarred from the Government schools, could not obtain an education, may be permitted in the reservation day and boarding schools, but it is preferable that it be not transferred to a nonreservation school, without permission from the Office. Children showing one-eighth or less Indian blood, whose parents do not live on an Indian reservation, whose home is among white people where there are churches and schools, who are presumed to have adopted the white man's manners and customs, and are to all intents and purposes white people, are debarred from enrollment in the Government nonreservation and reservation schools. Superintendents, in all cases where doubt exists as to the degree of Indian blood of a child proposed for transfer, should fully satisfy themselves of the facts by affidavits from reliable persons, which affidavits must be kept on file at the school.

A pupil who has been regularly enrolled in a nonreservation school must not be taken to any other nonreservation school without the consent of both Superintendents and the Commissioner of Indian Affairs, and Superintendents will be held to strict accountability for such pupils taken to their schools.

A pupil dismissed from school for cause must not be enrolled in any other school without the permission of the Commissioner of Indian Affairs. Full facts must be submitted with each request.

Reference is made to your letter of April 28, 1917, in which you direct attention to that paragraph of the Declaration of Policy in the Administration of Indian Affairs which refers to Indian students who have completed the course of instruction in the Governments school, being declared competent.

In accordance with these directions I have the honor to report that Maude Cooke, a 4 blood Mohawk Indian. 20 years of age, passed her examinations and on May 24. 1917, was graduated from this school in Home Economics, in accordance with the tentative course of study.

Maude is the daughter of Frank and Elizabeth Tarbell Cooke. She makes her home at Manitowac, Wisconsin. Her father is dead and her mother is a seamstress. She wants to become a seamstress.

Principal Blair reports that Maude is a fine, alert, ambitious, trustworthy girl. She is studiousand this done well in academic work, especially in English. She is an efficient seamstress and a good cook. Her personal appearance, her desk, her room at quarters, all indicate the fine instincts of the home-maker. In addition she has poise and a sweet disposition without being weak.
