Sir:

Reference is made to your letter of April 28, 1917, in which you ask direct attention to that paragraph of the Declaration of Policy in the Administration of Indian Affairs which refers to Indian students over 21 years of age and who have completed the full course of instruction in the Government schools being declared competent.

In accordance with these directions I have the honor to report that Arnold Holliday, a  $\frac{1}{4}$  blood Chippewa Indian, 21 years of age, will be graduated from Carlisle School, if he passes his examination, on May 24th.

Arnold has spent several years at Carlisle. He is to all intents and purposes a white man and looks like one. He has a bright mind, is very strong in English and mathematics. He is able to compete in schools with American young men. Academically he is very well equipped.

He has no particular equipment industrially. He reads a great deal and is very competent of understanding current literature.

Superintendent Everest under date of May 3, 1917, reports that Arnold Holliday is not a member of the Bad River tribe of Indians, that he has never been enrolled under the La Pointe Agency nor has he been given any allotment nor recognized as a member of the Bad River band.

It appears that he was an applicant for enrollment upon the Wooster allotment schedule approved something over two years ago, which request was denied by the McLaughlin-Wooster committee. Arnold has lived a good deal of the time in Odenah with his uncle, Henry Holliday, whose status in relation to membership is the same as his nephew, Arnold.

In view of the status of this young man it would seem unnecessary to take any step in his case as he is undoubtedly an American citizen and has no property subject to restriction.

Dear Mr. Francis:

Replying to your favor of the 30th ultimo, in relation to certificates of competency to be given to training school graduates, and which letter refers to the case of Arnold Holliday. It is found that Mr. Holliday is not a member of the Bad River tribe of Indians. He has never been enrolled here, nor has he been given any allotment nor recognized as a member of the Bad River Band. He has never received any rights here, although he was an applicant for enrollment upon the Wooster allotment schedule approved something over two years ago.

His request for recommendation at that time was denied by the McLaughlin-Wooster committee. Arnold, however, has lived a good deal of the time in Odanah with his uncle, Henry Holliday, whose status in relation to membership is the same as his nephew, Arnold.



## RUSSIAN TROOPS MILES IN THEIR

### ORDER BEING MAINTAINED

Flat River, Mo., July 16.—Comparative quiet has been maintained in the lead belt of Southeastern Missouri since the arrest yesterday of twenty men on charges of carrying concealed weapons or looting homes of evicted foreign born miners. The peaceable disposition of the crowds is due largely to the presence of Missouri National Guardsmen and the conciliatory work of State Labor Commissioner Lewis.

The situation still is serious, however, as the miners seem sincere in their belief that they are acting within their rights in driving out foreigners.

All day yesterday the exodus of the foreign-born continued and it is estimated that more than 1,000 have left the lead belt.

#### Trouble Appeared Imminent.

Serious trouble appeared imminent yesterday morning when 200 mining men from Elvins gathered in front of a troop train in which many Guardsmen still remained. The troops were ordered to detrain and a detachment of about twenty-five Guardsmen drew up facing the miners. A committee of

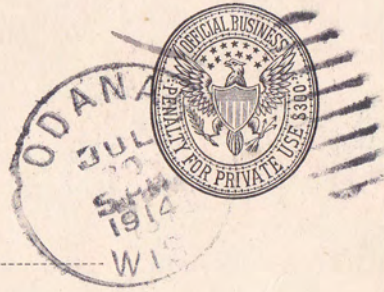

Dear Mr. Holliday:

I have received your favor of the 2nd instant in behalf of your nephew, Arnold S. Holliday, and have noted with care the information contained therein. I should certainly like to favor you and your nephew, but because his return home had to be effected so soon after his first enrolment here I would not now be justified in again providing transportation for his use at Government expense because the very strictest economy has to be practiced in the use of the funds that have been allotted us this year for the transportation of students.

It was our intention when Arnold was written to regarding his transportation several weeks ago to have him apply to Superintendent Everest for selection as escort to a party of students, and as the Superintendent has not made any recommendation in any one's favor it seems to me that there should yet be a chance for him to earn his transportation in that way.

My dear Mr. Lippis:-

My Nephew Arnold S.

Hulliday has turned over to me your letter of the 28th ult. After reading it over carefully I decided to take the matter up, as you suggest, with our Supt. Mr. Everest. He advised me to write you fully of the circumstances as I related them to him and he assured me that you would give the case your careful attention. And he could see no reason why Arnold could not be entered as a new student.

If you will remember Arnold was sent home to undergo an operation for an undescended testical, as he is an

and this expense of a necessity fell  
on me. Last year I found that my  
finances would not warrant my doing  
this as I have a family of five of my  
own to look after, beside my invalid  
mother. Arnold's condition had gradually  
grown worse so that it became impossible  
for him to do work of any kind, in fact  
the doctor here, Dr. A. Siscock M.D. told  
me that he, Arnold, was in a serious con-  
dition and that he did not feel equal to the  
task as it required a specialist's attention.  
By considerable inconvenience I have been  
able to see Arnold through those expenses  
which total about \$150<sup>00</sup>. The operation  
has proven successful and Dr. Siscock  
now pronounces him cured. I find that  
it will almost be impossible for Arnold  
to get up a party of six as Mrs. O'Brien



I have been thinking that why not list the boys enrolled at Cornell that are within the conscription age limits and have them volunteer their services subject to coll. (I am sure the boys would loyally respond) and in this way eliminate ourselves from being drafted. What do you think about it?

Reference is made to your letter of April 28, 1917, in which you direct attention to that paragraph of the Declaration of Policy in the Administration of Indian Affairs which refers to Indian students who have completed the course of instruction in the Government schools being declared competent.

In accordance with these directions I have the honor to report that Arnold Holliday, a  $\frac{1}{2}$  blood Chippewa, 23 years of age, passed his examinations and on May 24, 1917, was graduated from this school in agriculture in accordance with the old course of study.

Arnold is the son of William Holliday of Odanah, Wis. His parents are both dead. The clerk in charge of the La Pointe Agency reports that he is not a member of the Bad River Band of Chippewas and has therefore no allotment and no funds to his credit on the books of the office. He believes that he is a Michigan Indian connected with the Mackinac Agency. He told me personally that he made application to be placed upon the Wooster roll of Bad River Indians, but his application was refused.

Principal Blair and Mr. R. H. Bradley, Director of Mechanic Arts, report that Arnold is a very gentlemanly boy, excellent in English because it is easy for him. He has little application and is vacillating in the extreme, the result very largely of too much petting at home. He is his grandmother's darling. He is intelligent above the average Indian boy of the same age, likes to read good books, and can talk intelligently about them. He has had two years of High School

work but he is not studious. He loses much time in trying to arrive at a decision. He is of excellent moral character and very pleasing in appearance.

Arnold is to all intents and purposes a white man. Should it be found in the future that he is entitled to any property subject to Government control, any restrictions against his person or property should be promptly removed.

He is in good health and careful in handling his money.


