

Superintendent of Haskell Institute, Lawrence, Kansas, in regarding to your future. Under the regulations Mr. Peairs would not be permitted to pay transportation from the State of New York. If you remember him you will have in mind the fact that he is lame and this infirmity prevents him from following some of the more active trades, and it would seem that a professional career might be wetter for him. We have taken up the future of each graduate with them personally and we have learned of Henry's aspiration to become a lawyer.

Henry is a New York Indian of onehalf blood and has no financial resources. The tuition at Conway Hall while he would be preparing for Dickinson Law School would be almost prohibitive to him.

Of course after he got his feet on the ground in Lawrence it might be possible for him to get into something which would enable him to take care of himself while going through the University Law School. Should he be unable to meet the cost of his transportation to Lawrence, it might be possible the Office would authorize this exception to the general rule, although I hesitate to request it unless no other plan is feasible.
