INDORSEMENT.

A child showing one-sixteenth or less Indian blood, whose parents live on an Indian reservation, Indian fashion, who, if debarred from the Government schools, could not obtain an education, may be permitted in the reservation day and boarding schools, but it is preferable that it be not transferred to a nonreservation school, without permission from the Office. Children showing one-eighth or less Indian blood, whose parents do not live on an Indian reservation, whose home is among white people where there are churches and schools, who are presumed to have adopted the white man's manners and customs, and are to all intents and purposes white people, are debarred from enrollment in the Government nonreservation and reservation schools. Superintendents, in all cases where doubt exists as to the degree of Indian blood of a child proposed for transfer, should fully satisfy themselves of the facts by affidavits from reliable persons, which affidavits must be kept on file at the school.

A pupil who has been regularly enrolled in a nonreservation school must not be taken to any other non-reservation school without the consent of both Superintendents and the Commissioner of Indian Affairs, and Superintendents will be held to strict accountability for such pupils taken to their schools.

A pupil dismissed from school for cause must not be enrolled in any other school without the permission of the Commissioner of Indian Affairs. Full facts must be submitted with each request.

Joseph White's ticket was placed at the same time and it is hoped you can plan to bring Joseph with you when you return here.

An application for your reenrolment can be signed after you return here because the excellent record you made during your first period of enrolment is all the recommendation that is needed in your case.

Sir:

Reference is made to your letter of April 28, 1917 in which you refer to that paragraph of the Declaration of Policy in the Administration of Indian Affairs which refers to Indian students who have completed the course of instruction in the Government schools, being declared competent.

In accordance with these directions I have the honor to report that Peter Tarbell, a $\frac{3}{4}$ blood Mohawk Indian, 22 years of age, having completed the course at the Ford Factory was graduated from this school on May 24, 1917. He was the Ford Factory for not quite a year. In that time he earned \$689.79 spending \$442.25, and saving \$247.45.

Principal Blair reports that Peter is a bright young man with considerable independence of character. He is not studious. He has no bad habits. He has now enrolled in the Army.

Peter Tarbell comes from a tribe over the members of which the government has never exercised jurisdiction, of the person or property.

He is perfectly competent to manage his own affairs, and I recommend the issuance of a certificate of competency to him.

My dear Peter:

Your letter of September 23d came to me while I was away from the school. I was very glad indeed to hear from you. From it I learned that you boys are at last in France and are at the place where the big things for your country must be done. I wish you boys every sort of good luck. I know you will be true to the standards of Carlisle and that you will be true to yourself, your race and your country in the hour of trial, may God bless you and send you back to us all in safety.

We have had quite a bit of excitement here. A boy from New York returned from his vacation and developed a case of small pox, he of course was isolated in the hospital. They had the hospital quarantined for three days, then the State Board of Health came along and quarantined the whole school, they even fumigated the mail. Last Saturday, however, they removed the quarantine on the school, it is still on the hospital but that will be removed now in a very short time.

We have a fine football team but it is composed inexperienced players, only two of them have ever played in big games. When they were down to Annapolis to play the Navy, they shied at the band and the crowd and were defeated 63 to nothing. Last Saturday they went down to play John Hopkins and defeated them 15 to 7. The score would have been more but there were a few fumbles.

We have more students on the grounds
than we have had in years. General Pratt is
coming back to visit us this week and I intend to
have inspection and review for him.
