Reference is made to your letter of April 28, 1917, in which you direct attention to that paragraph of the Declaration of Policy in the Administration of Indian Affairs which refers to Indian students over 21 years of age and who have completed the full course of instruction in the Government schools, being declared competent.

In accordance with these directions I have the honor to report that George Tibbetts, 202/16 blood Chippewa Indian, 22 years of age, was graduated from Carlisle, having passed his examination, on May 24, 1917.

Superintendent Hinton of the White Earth

Agency reports that George has no individual Indian

money at his agency but that he has original allotment

No. 2231, comprising the S/2 of SW/4, Section 3,

Township 146, N., Range 40 W. 5th P.M., containing

80 acres. This tract is a sandy loam covered with brush

and valued at \$1000.

It appears that he also owns additional allot-

No. 1626, comprising the W/2 of SE/4, Section

Township 146 N., Range 38 W. 5th P.M., containing

so acres. The tract is brush land and has a light sandy

loam soil and is valued at \$640.

The Superintendent invites attention to the fact that George owns this land in fee simple by virtue of the Act of June 21, 1916, which vested fee title to their allotments of land in all adult mixed blood Indians of the White Earth Reservation.

Principal Blair reports that George is one of the best qualified of our graduates. He is always dependable and willing to do what he should to the best of his ability. He is a good student, a hard worker, and a fine boy in every way. He is preticularly well qualified in athletics, music (band), indoor gymnasium, and as a drillmaster in the school battalion.

Director of Mechanic Arts Bradley reports that George Tibbetts (Thompson's) morals are beyond reproach and he has enough education and ability to make his way in the world.

George Tibbetts Phompson has the appearance of a white man and acts like a white man in all of his dealings. He is a splendid young man, honorable, ambitious and energetic, and perfectly capable of managing his own affairs.

Apparently no further steps are necessary to be taken in his case, unless it would be the issuance of a

certificate of competency. If this is deemed advisable I most strongly recommend that it be done.

I shall ask your School and Reservation Superintendents to report to me at that time about you.

Should you hereafter desire to apply under applicable laws for a patent in fee or for the removal of any restrictions on land allotted to you, the inclosed certificate will show that you are educationally qualified to make free use of your property, and, in the absence of later information or developments to the contrary, will be so recognized if submitted to me for consideration in connection with the action then to be determined.

George W. Tibbetts is a 3/16 blood Chippewa from the White Earth reservation, Minnesota. He enrolled in Carlisle in 1911 and graduated in 1917. Prior to that time he attended the Pipestone Indian School for three years and the Tower Indian School for 2½ years, at which institution he was Lieutenant and Captain of his company. He was, 3½ years, Captain of a company at this school which four times won the prize in Competitive drills. He has spent three summers at a Summer Camp as Councilor and at the present time is employed at this school as director of athletics.

George is a man of the highest character. He is capable of handling men as shown by his experience. He is absolutely to be depended upon at all times. He was Captain of the Indian School football team for the season of 1917.

In addition to the above, Mr. Tibbetts received Industrial training and graduated in the course of Carpentry as given at this school. He is a young man of real ability and unquestionably would be of value to the Military Service of the United States.

THAT KAMP MOHUT engages the services of Mr. George Tibbetts as camp councilor, at Oxford, Maine, and agrees to de ray Mr. Tibbetts' transportation from New York City to KAMP KOHUT and return, and all other expenses of maintenance, aundry, etc., and to pay a fee of Fifty Dollars (\$50.00) for the entire season of nine weeks, beginning with July 1st, 1915 and ending with September 3rd, 1915. KAMP KOHUT stipulates that Mr. Tibbetts devote his time and attention exclusively to the care of the camp community and that he pledge himself to fulfill the duties imposed by his office to the best of his ability.

Dear Mr. Lipps:

I have your letter of May 5th with enclosures, in which you say that George Tibbetts wishes the enrolment of his brother Flmer in the Carlisle school upon completion of his term of enrolment here next June.

In answer I have to say that Flmer is in the fifth grade and is rather small for his age. There is much that he can do at Pipestone before being transferred to another school and in view of paragraph No. 119a of the Rules which expressly prohibits the transfer of pupils from one non-reservation school to another, except upon good cause, I do not approve Hlmer's transfer at this time. There is absolutely no reason why he should go to Carlisle yet, except that his brother is there, which in my opinion does not constitute a sufficient reason.

Please do not understand from this that I will oppose the transfer of any pupil whose case warrants

it. Under the present management, I believe that Carlisle is one of the best schools in the Service and when one of our pupils reaches a status that warrants transfer, I shall not he sitate to endorse the same. In my estimation, Circular No.1044, if properly enforced, will do much towards correcting the worst evil of the Indian school system and regardless of what effect it may have on my particular work, I wish to do everything in my power to carry out its provisions.
