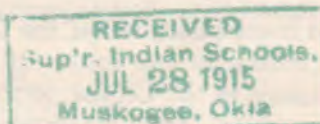

SPECIAL NOTE.

This form must be executed in duplicate when a child is transferred from a reservation to a non-reservation school. The Superintendent of the nonreservation school will retain the original for his files, and the duplicate shall be deposited in the Agency records. The agent will then send to the Commissioner of Indian Affairs his certificate as provided by law. All the blanks must be properly filled in every case.

NOTE.—Age limits, fourteen to twenty years. Preferably fourteen to eighteen. Students must be at least one-fourth Indian, preferably full Indian. Special cases beyond the age limit will be given consideration. An industrial course only can be taken and the term reduced to three years, in exceptional cases.

INDORSEMENTS.

The laws relating to the transfer of Indian children from reservations and schools are as follows:

That hereafter no Indian child shall be sent from any Indian reservation to a school beyond the State or Territory in which said reservation is situated without the voluntary consent of the father or mother of such child if either of them is living, and if neither of them is living without the voluntary consent of the next of kin of such child. Such consent shall be made before the agent of the reservation, and he shall send to the Commissioner of Indian Affairs his certificate that such consent has been voluntarily given before such child shall be removed from such reservation. And it shall be unlawful for any Indian agent or other employee of the Government to induce, or seek to induce, by withholding rations or by other improper means, the parents or next of kin of any Indian to consent to the removal of any Indian child beyond the limits of any reservation. (28 Stats., p. 906.)

Provided, that hereafter no Indian child shall be taken from any school in any State or Territory to a school in any other State against its will or without the written consent of its parents. (29 Stats., p. 348.)

The rules provide that—

A pupil who has been regularly enrolled in a nonreservation school must not be taken to any other nonreservation school without the consent of both Superintendents and the Commissioner of Indian Affairs, and Superintendents will be held to strict accountability for such pupils taken to their schools.

An Indian boy or girl 18 years old and over may, without the consent of parents or others, personally sign the application form on its being changed to suit the case.

This form is to be used only in transfers from reservations, or Indian schools, to nonreservation schools.

Sir:

Reference is made to your letter of April 28, 1917, in which you direct attention to that paragraph of the Declaration of Policy in the Administration of Indian Affairs which refers to Indian students who have completed the course of instruction in the Government schools, being declared competent.

In accordance with these directions I have the honor to report that Rhoda Fobb, a full blood Choctaw Indian, 19 years of age, passed her examinations and on May 24, 1917, was graduated from this school under the Tentative course of study in Home Economics.

Rhoda is the daughter of James and Frances Janis Fobb of Gavin, Okla. Her father was well educated but her mother was not. She was a good housekeeper however. She has considerable land and money. She has worked in all departments at Carlisle. She likes to sew. Wants further schooling. She was formerly a student at Wheelock.

Principal Blair reports that Rhoda has been at Carlisle nearly two years. She has more than ordinary intelligence which she manifests in all lines of work, offered here. She is a fine girl, very calm, steady, and dependable. She has dramatic ability, is fond of good books and reads them understandingly. She has a fine sense of honor, has pride of the right kind and is ambitious for a higher education with determination enough to acquire it independent of others.

Superintendent Parker reports that Rhoda has 230 acres of land.

Matilda G. Ewing reports that Rhoda is a strong healthy girl, of more than ordinary strength of character. She is economical in dress and is a neat and clean housekeeper. She is deliberate in judgment, therefore keeping out of the many mixups come girls get into. In sewing and fancywork she is very industrious.

Rhoda is in good health and careful in spending money.

Rhoda is a girl of splendid character. She has so much Indian blood, that despite the fact that she has a splendid reputation, I would hesitate to remove her restrictions at this time. Her future will depend a great deal upon the type of man she marries if she marries at all, and I would wait until her future life is somewhat settled, before taking action in her case. I recommend that no steps be taken at this time.
