Reference is made to your letter of April 28d 1917, in which you direct attention to that paragraph of the Declaration of Policy in the Administration of Indian Affairs which refers to Indian students over 21 years of age and who have completed the full course of instruction in the Government schools, being declared competent.

In accordance with these directions

I have the honor to report that Peter Jackson, a

full blood Shoshone Indian, 25 years of age, was
graduated from Carlisle, having passed his examination, on May 24, 1917.

Western Shoshone Agency, Owyhee, Nevada, reports that
Peter has no land or money or any other property, with
the possible exception of seven or eight head of horses
which may all be dead, as the supply of hay on the
reservation was exhausted about the 1st of February and
it was necessary to turn the stock loose to forage.

He reports that many horses and cattle died as a result.

and it is possible that Peter Jackson's stock perished.

Jackson has been in school several years but has not been able to make the advancement he should have made. He reports that he has been more or less handicapped by the tubercular swelling in his neck. He is a little inclined to resent advice and council and to feel that his own judgement is best. Mr. Blair considers him not a bad boy and most of the time tries to do what is right.

Director of Mechanic Arts Bradley reports that Peter Jackson is somewhat of a quitter when his tubercular glands give him trouble. He considers his morals good.

Superintendent Waddell fails to bring out
the fact that the Western Shoshone reservation has not
been allotted and that when it is allotted Peter will,
in the natural course of events, receive an allotment.
While this youngm man is under some physical disability
by reason of his tubercular glands it is doubtful whether
he will survive a great many years. He has completed
his academic work here, has some skill as a musician,
and as a last resort might make his living that way.

I feel that he is perfectly competent to manage his own affairs and I would recommend that he

be given a certificate of competency with a view to giving him full control of such property as may come to him.



There is enclosed herewith the registration card prepared by you at this school. It appears that at the time you prepared it you did not sign it thereby affirming your answers. You were away from the school when the error was caught up by Mr. Blair, who was appointed by the local registrar to certify for the eards of this school.

In order that there might not be any deay in registering you he signed a statement on the card to the effect that while you had been under his charge for the entire year and had not signed the card at the bottom, that he knew and certified that you had written your name at the top in answer to question one.

Your card has now been returned, however, by Oscar M. Waddell, Superintendent of
your reservation in Nevada, with the statement
that your present place of occupation, military
service and grounds for exemption not indicated and that you had not signed the card.
He therefore suggests that we attend to the
matter of procuring your registration and forwarding the card at our early convenience.

In view of the fact that you are now at Rocky Ford, Colorado, I am not sure of just the steps you should take. I suggest, however, that you ask Mr. Dagenett's representative to go with you to the nearest local registering officer, taking this card which was prepared under our direction at the school prior to the date of registration. Advise him fully of the difficulty and be guided by him as to whether you should sign your original card and make the

other answers desired by Mr. Waddell and then send it to him at the Western Shoshone Agency. Nevada, or whether he will permit you to register with him in view of the fact that you propose to remain there for some time. The big point is to take immediate action on the advice of the local authorities so that they may understand that your failure to have a certificate is due to a technical error and no desire on your part to avoid your responsibilities.

The registration card is enclosed. Please advise me of your action and above all things be sure you do something, because as we indicated to you here it is your duty and you must register and if it is not done you may find yourself in trouble.
