INDORSEMENT.

A child showing one-sixteenth or less Indian blood, whose parents live on an Indian reservation, Indian fashion, who, if debarred from the Government schools, could not obtain an education, may be permitted in the reservation day and boarding schools, but it is preferable that it be not transferred to a nonreservation school, without permission from the Office. Children showing one-eighth or less Indian blood, whose parents do not live on an Indian reservation, whose home is among white people where there are churches and schools, who are presumed to have adopted the white man's manners and customs, and are to all intents and purposes white people, are debarred from enrollment in the Government nonreservation and reservation schools. Superintendents, in all cases where doubt exists as to the degree of Indian blood of a child proposed for transfer, should fully satisfy themselves of the facts by affidavits from reliable persons, which affidavits must be kept on file at the school.

A pupil who has been regularly enrolled in a nonreservation school must not be taken to any other non-reservation school without the consent of both Superintendents and the Commissioner of Indian Affairs, and Superintendents will be held to strict accountability for such pupils taken to their schools.

A pupil dismissed from school for cause must not be enrolled in any other school without the permission of the Commissioner of Indian Affairs. Full facts must be submitted with each request.

Sir:

Reference is made to your letter of April 28, 1917, in which you direct attention to that paragraph of the Declaration of Policy in the Administration of Indian Affairs which refers to Indian students who have completed the course of instruction in the Government schools, being declared competent.

In accordance with these directions I have the honor to report that Lena Parker, a $\frac{1}{2}$ blood Seneca Indian, 17 years of age, passed her examinations in nursing, in accordance with a Special Course.

Lena is the daughter of William and Lillian Els Parker of Versailles, N. Y. Her father is a farmer and he with her mother was educated at Carlisle. Her mother is dead. She has worked in all departments since coming to Carlisle, but likes the hospital best.

Principal Blair reports that Lena is impulsive, rather uncertain and inclined to see only the humorous side of things. She is not studious, but applies herself under competition. She is always pleasant and cheerful.

Matilda Ewing reports that Lena is a young inexperienced girl who is easily led by others.

Matilda is in good health, and spends her money freely.
Lena

Lena is a New York Indian, a tribe over which the government has never exercised jurisdiction as to person or property.

In view of her age, there should be no steps taken regarding her competency. I would recommend when she becomes of age that a certificate of competency be granted to her.

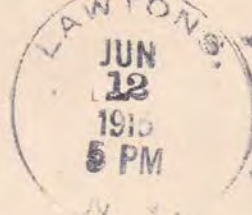
