Reference is made to your letter of April 28, 1917, in which you direct attontion to that peragraph of the Declaretion of Policy in the Administration of Indian fileirs which refers to Indian students who have completed the course of instruction in the Governmant schools, being declared eompetent.

In scoordance with these airections I have the honor to report that Prancis Ojibway, a z blood Ohipperr, 18 yeers of age, passed his examinations and on May 24, 1917, was graduated from this sohool in obiperdery under the old course of study.

Francis is the son of John B. and Annie M. Ojibway of Cloquet, Minn. His father is a Covernment farmer and both parents have a fair education.

Superintendent Cross reports thet Franols has no land whatsoever, having been too young to be allotted under the act of Januery 14, 1889.

Prircipal Blair and Roy H. Bradley, Disector of leohanie Arts, report that arancis ie a manly boy, clever, smbitious to $x$ ise in the world and to do something worth while. He is good in all minglish branches and has a good memory for facts and reasons well. He has a very quick temper but controls it admirably. In a asse of discipine in which he is involved one aan always appeal to his tonse of justice to do the right thing. He is careless and is inclined to take his duties 1ighti.y. He has had two satis-
factory years in the carpenter shop. Ho has a happy disposition and sterling qualities of mind that win respect and confidence. His health is good and he is careful in spending money.

In view of these facts it would seem that Prancis is mply able to manage his own affairs and should ho, in the future, derive any interests in any property subject to Govermment control. I would recommend that any restrietions upon his person be removed as soon as fhe pan legaply be done:

Dear Mr. Cross:

Upon receipt of your favor of the lath instant. in regard to a complaint that has been mede by Francis ojibway to the effect that he cannot take the work here he desired to get, I had inquiry made and learned that in school Francis has made but very ordinary marks. In his industrial work he started off so well that our newly appointed Director of Mechanic Arts took special interest in him with a view of preparing him for selection to take a course of work in the Cadillac Motor Car Company's establishment in Detroit, Michigan. The place would have given the young man a splendid opportunity to do good work and to prepare for a position very much better than is ordinarily obtained by Indian young men regardless of their training. However, you will molly see that if Francis is not willing to take the work that can be given here that nothing can be done for him.

I have also learned that the probable reason for the young man's complaint about the lack of facilities for learn-

ing a trade at this school is the finct that hie fother has been writing to him about a position he oovld get as fireman at the newly built hospital under your jurisdiction. If the father's i\&oe of what oonstitutes a good position for his son is what he has in mind ond Francis is willing to give up the chance he has here to prepare himself for something better than a laborer"g job no óhjoction to his going home vill be interposed if he can provide the amount that will be required to pay for his transportation, I mould have to insist, however, that he reimburse the govemment for the amount that had to bo expeniled to bring him to Carlisle.

## Mr. Meyer:-

0jibway is enrolled in the highest class we have in the school. If he did work in advance of that before he came here, that is not our fault. I do not know that he did. He brought no statement of work previously done. I took his word for it that he had finished Grade VIII (common branches) and assigned him to First Year Vocstional secondary and he chose the Mechanic Arts Course. His marks for the first term were English 91, Vocational Arithmetic 78, Agriculture (as substitute for drawing) 70. His marks in Arithmetic and Agriculture were not startlingly high, it will be observed. Class is now taking vocational algebra and next term will take geometry.

I have given him credit for our required work in object drawing and I assigned him to the work in carpentry, which he had not had. Heither had he had painting and blacksmithing. In fact, no vocational work of any sort had he done before coming here. I think he will find enough to keep him busy here, if he will just look for it.
